#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, India is the premier training institution in the country for the members of the civil services. Its primary task is to impart induction level training to members of All India Services and Central Services (Group 'A') in a Common Foundational Course, and to provide professional training to the regular recruits to the Indian Administrative Service. The Academy also conducts in-service training courses for middle to senior ranking members of the Indian Administrative Service, and for officers recently selected or promoted to the Indian Administrative Services. In addition, workshops/seminars and research is conducted in issues relevant to public policy and in training methodology.

#### The Trainee

During the year a total of 32 courses/ workshops/ seminars were conducted. 1022 participants attended against 1234 in 35 courses/workshops/seminars/specialised courses organised during 1994. Table projects the distribution of trainees in various courses during 1994 and 1995.

Out of 1022 participants, who attended courses/workshops/seminars/specialised courses conducted by the Academy during 1995, 94 were women. There was marginal improvement in the representation of women participants, compared to 1994 as shown in Table.

#### Faculty Development

The Academy has a systematic process on an institutional basis to upgrade and update the skills, knowledge and the instructional techniques of its faculty. The faculty members are deputed to reputed institutions both in the country and abroad. In addition, a number of workshops on different subjects including training methodology are held from time to time. Details of such activities are in Chapter - IV.

#### Academy Journal, "The Administrator"

The editorial policy of "The Administrator" is to focus on issues which are of contemporary relevance and significance in the domain of public policy and practice. "The Administrator" is either thematic in content, as a result of which we have special issues, which covered a wide variety of subjects of general interest. This year, special issues, on Gender came out just prior to the International Conference at Beijing. The Administrator also covered two areas, "which have subjects of much attention in India-economic reforms and sustainable development." #### Medical Facilities

The dispensary provides out patient care to all officer trainees, faculty, staff and their families. Emergency care is provided round the clock. Referral facilities are made available at the Military Hospital Dehradun, District Doon Hospital, Coronation Hospital at Dehradun and St. Mary's Hospital at Mussoorie.

A camp was organised for National Polio Eradication Programme on 9th December, 1995. A health camp for Rickshaw Pullers was also organised on the same day.

A Blood donation camp was arranged with the help of the "Indian Red Cross Society, New Delhi".

Talk on National Health Programmes and other related topics like AIDS and Plague were delivered to the faculty members, employees and their families.

First Aid classes were conducted for officer trainees of LXI Foundational Course by Doctors and staff of dispensary

#### Other Facilities

Charleville has got a post office in the Academy's own premises which caters to the Academy and the neighbourhood. The State Bank of India has an evening branch at the gate of the Academy. In addition, a Kendriya Bhandar, a barber shop, a tailor shop and a bakery meets the daily needs of the inmates and visitors to the Academy.

#### Academy Spirit

A striking feature of the Academy, apart from its infrastructure, is it quaint mixture of the new and the old. It is this very spirit of the Academy which is personified by the officer trainees and all those who work in the Academy, trying to uphold values of integrity, commitment and idealism. It is perhaps this spirit of the Academy that each one carries out of the Academy as he or she leaves its august portals to step into the vastness, that is India.

#### 2. FACULTIES

## 2.1 FACULTY OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION AND SOCIAL MANAGEMENT

#### Faculty

Excluding the Joint Director, the Public Administration faculty has a strength of 10, comprising of 8 Deputy Directors, one Professor of Public Administration and one Professor of Social Management. During the year, Shri Sanjeev Chopra joined the faculty on 18<sup>th</sup> December, 1995.

#### Training Content

Training inputs are designed primarily on the basis of course objectives. The broad air of the inputs provided by the Public Administration faculty is development of trainees into sensitised,

confident and professional administrators with values and attitudes appropriate to the task of nation building.

#### Methodology

Most of the inputs are conducted on a modular structure. According to this relevant themes are chosen and dealt with in a consolidated fashion so that all aspects relating to them are dealt with comprehensively. A module may consist of all or some of the following methodologies:

- i) Lectures by both in-house and guest faculty
- ii) Panel discussions
- iii) Case studies
- iv) Film discussions
- v) Group discussions
- vi) Field visits
- vii) Simulation exercises

The inputs of Public Administration include also a number of measures to build among civil servant the attitudes and values appropriate for public service. The skills and knowledge required by a professional civil servant are relatively easier to impart, and tehse have traditionally been the strength of the Academy. However, to impinge positively in the brief period available to us for training, on the attitudes and values of intelligent young men and women in their mid-twenties or older, drawn from a wide variety of backgrounds and experiences, is a much more formidable task.

There is a high consensus about the attitudes and values required for public service. These are integrity, moral courage, empathy with and respect for the underprivileged, and freedom from any sectarian prejudices based on religion, region, caste, class or gender. However, it is precisely these values that are under the greatest siege and threat today in the wider society, particularly in the light of turbulent conflicts and upheavals of the last decade in our country. It would be futile to expect that a recruitment system which tests academic merit and capacity for hard work would throw up young people unaffected by this malaise's of the wider society. It was clear to us that conventional classroom lecture methodology would be the most inappropriate to make an impact on these attitude and values. We have, therefore, innovated with several new methodologies, and achieved significant success. For instance, carefully selected were screened. Sometimes these were followed with films discussions with the director. Thus, for instance, Anand patwardhan and Saeed Mirza have been regularly visiting the Academy and the screening of their films on sensitive subjects like communalism, have been followed up with passionate and introspective debate. A related methodology has been to use theatre, including street theatre. Well known progressive street theatre groups like SAHMAT and NISHANT have been invited to on communalism, corruption, Oppression stage pays bureaucratic functionaries and so on, and these have been well received. Habib tanvir's landmark play on humanism and secularism "Jis Lahore Nahin Dekhya Wo Janmya Nahin" is also regularly staged. SAHMAT was also invited to put up their exhibitions against communalism.

Carefully selected case studies, such as on communal riots, corruption, intolerance of democratic dissent etc. have been found to be effective, because these are read by trainees and then debated in small groups. We have also invited as role models outstanding young officers who have unimpeachable records in terms of integrity, moral coverage and secular values. The academy has also recently broken new ground by encouraging as part of its training methodology the officer-trainees to intervene directly with the outside community. Thus for the first time, officer trainees related to the problems of the hand-rickshaw pullers in Mussoorie and developed a programme for their rehabilitation in more humane occupations, and will implement this project during the present season. They were given responsibility for and responded with sincerity and commitment for intervention for improving the balwadi and school, for providing alternate livelihoods to mess employee's families, for planning night shelters and afforestation and environmental improvement in Mussoorie and so on. When strapped for funds for some social interventions, there are some groups which have voluntarily pooled their own money for this purpose. An unprecedented health camp for the urban poor of Mussoorie was organised in which over 600 people were examined and many major illnesses diagnosed. We have found that the young officer trainees have responded extremely favourably to these measures, and their natural idealism has stood strengthened and reinforced.

#### Other Activities

The members of the Public Administration faculty looked after different administrative responsibilities like Establishment, Estates, Supplies and Services, Accounts, Finance and Budget, Library, Computers and Outdoor activities. They also shouldered the responsibility as counsellor for IAS Officer Trainees allotted to different cadres, besides being Counsellors for the officer trainees of the Foundational Course. In addition, Dr. V.K. Agnihotri, Shri Padamvir Singh, Shri Amarjeet Sinha, Shri P.M. V. Siromony, Prof. A. Santhosh Mathew, Shri Sanjeev Chopra

and Prof. Harsh Mander participated in the activities of research units in the capacities as Chairman/Project Coordinators/members.

#### 2.2 FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT

#### Pedagogy

Emphasis is on "Participatory Learning" and "Learning through experience sharing". Accordingly more than 75% of the academic input was provided through case studies, group exercises and assignments, seminars and interactive sessions with practising successful administrative officers. As an administrator's major role is "Co-ordination", Group assignments and presentation were an important part of all the programmes as they provide opportunities to the officers to hone their skills in the areas of team building, providing leadership and in oral and written communication.

#### Course Inputs

The Syllabi for the various courses was reviewed and revised during the year keeping in mind the feedback of officer trainees and the current policy initiatives of liberalisation of the economy. Thus for the FC and Phase-I inputs in operations Management in the services sector, Management Information Systems at District Level, Role of District Administration in Promotion of entrepreneurship were introduced. During the Phase-I Officer trainees also spent time with

select/public/private units and a Stock Exchange to gain insight into their functioning. During In-service Courses basic concepts and techniques, as covered during Foundational Course, were covered. For course for officers of 10-16 and 17-20 years seniority, the emphasis was on Strategic Management and Policy Analysis. These topics were mostly covered by Guest Faculty. We propose to undertake field studies and research in these areas and to develop expertise with a view to impart inputs to the trainees as well as to create sound information base which may help policy makers in the government.

#### Miscellaneous

The Management faculty was co-ordinated by Shri Ranjan Dwivedi and later on by Shri Padamvir Singh during the year. Shri K.K. Sharma, Shri S., K. Ghosh and Shri Brij Pal Singh Co-ordinator assisted the in imparting academic inputs. Management faculty has been networking with other training institutions in order to keep abreast of the latest developments. Faculty of Indian Institute of management, Ahmedabad has been assisting the Academy in providing inputs to the Professional Course trainees. Academy faculty has also been providing training support to other reputed institutions such Management Development Institute Gurgaon, Defence as Institute of Work Studies, Mussoorie, and HCM Rajasthan Institute of Public Administration, Jaipur

#### 2.3 FACULTY OF LAW

#### Aspects of Law Training

The Foundational Course was basically knowledge-centred. It was essentially designed to expose the trainees to the basic concepts and general principles of Law. Adequate care was, however, taken to ensure that law was not perceived to be a pure social science of an abstract nature. That law could be and should be applied as an instrument of social change, progress and development was emphasised, citing concrete examples.

During Phase-I Training programme, the thrust was more on development of skills. Skills, simply speaking, means, application of knowledge to solve real life situations.

When the officer-trainees came back to the Academy for Phase-II programme, Law training became substantially practice-oriented. How to organise court work, how to conduct adjudicatory proceedings, how to manage man and material, how to write out judgements and such other practical were the focus of training.

During the district training, the IAS Probationers were required, as an integral part of their training programme, to hold trials involving offences and to conduct inquiries under the Cr.P.C. in exercise of the powers of Special Judicial Magistrate and Executive Magistrate, respectively, conferred upon them by the competent Authorities. The judgements and the orders delived by them were examined by the members of the Law faculty, (from the copies furnished to the Academy) with a view not only to assessing the quality of their judicial work but also to giving them practical guidance for betterment.

In-service programmes attempts: To keep the participants abreast of the recent developments in the realm of law, human rights jurisprudence, emerging legal notions and contemporary trends of judicial thoughts.

#### Methodology

- i) Lecture with emphasis on participation and involvement of the officer-trainees
- ii) Case Studies
- iii) Problem-solving exercises
- iv) Order-writing and Judgement-writing exercises, followed by discussion and supply of model orders.
- v) Participative dialogue and interaction
- vi) Moot Courts
- vii) Mock Trials
- viii) Integrated Modular form
- ix) Field study related to legal issues.
- x) Panel discussion were used.

#### Inculcation and Fortification of Values

Increase of knowledge by itself is not enough, unless it is accompanied by increase in wisdom. Similarly, if skills are not backed by values, they are likely to lead to undesirable results. Hence, great emphasis was laid on the value part of the training. The task was certainly not east, yet it was undertaken in right spirit by the members of the Faculty of Law along with their colleagues in other Faculties. The values, specially those enshrined in the Constitution and the laws of India such as - Secularism, Rule of Law, Social justice, Respect for Human rights, Protective Discrimination in favour of the down-trodden,

udner-privileged and disadvantaged, integrity of character, impartiality of behaviour and political neutrality were given adequate attention. In that context, a good number of cases involving IAS and IPS Officers recently decided by the Supreme Court, were referred to and discussed. Case-studies, based on the facts of some contemporary Supreme Court decisions, were conducted by the Law faculty, Mention may be made of the following:-

- a) Case study entitled "Main Zille Ka Raja Hun" Administration and Human Right in Jhabua, M.P. by Ms. Amita Baviskar.
- b) Case Study entitled "Three Police Officers of Haryana Jailed" - by Prof. D. Banerjea
- c) Case Study on "A Senior IAS Officer Jailed for Contempt of Court" By Prof. D. Banerjea.

#### 2.4 FACULTY OF ECONOMICS

Of the sactioned posts of 3 professors, 1 reader and 2 assistant professor, the Faculty of Economics this year had the following members:

#### Course Inputs

The course inputs for this foundational course were revised to match with the New Economic Policies of the country. Emphasis was laid on topics like Markets and Market Failures, Government Intervention and Government Failures and Lesson

from the Asian Tigers. A panel discussion of three sessions was organised for the Officer trainees to share views on the Economics Reforms. Some sessions were also devoted to the study of important economic issues like State and Equity, Economics of Land and Agriculture, Rural Urban Migration and rural Informal Sector. Important topics of Management Science were also takenup by the Economics Faculty. Under this the topics of Statistical concepts for Administrators, Micro Studies in Social Science and Social Cost benefit Analysis was taken up. In the sessions dealing with Welfare, Equity and Poverty Issues the Economic Faculty was concerned with the topics on Social welfare, Equity and their Measurement, Aspects and Dimensins of Poverty in India and Employment and Poverty Alleviation. The Professional Training of the IAS Officers requires not only theory of Economics but partical working of hthedifferent aspects of the economy and different programmes of the Government in the light of general economic principles. Hence topics on Rural Development, Land Reform, Agriculture and Watershed Development, Rural Industrialisation, Forest Land, Food Security, Literacy and Universal elementary Education (UEE) were the course material of the Economic Facity.

Under the sandwich pattern, the Phase-II of the professional course provides an opportunity to the Officer Trainees to make presentations on 'field experience' in their respective districts of training. The most valuable and exciting of them all is the 'Socio-economic survey of a Village', followed by 'Tribal and 'Land Reform' Assisgnments. Some Optional Assignments were also taken up relating to Project management. The presentations of the Socio-economic Surveys' for the Phasse-II 9193 batch) was

co-ordinated by Professor Brij Pal Singh, Preparation of Integrated Projects (IP) under the Optional Assignment was co-ordinated by Professor Atinder Sen.

#### Other Highlights

Professor Brij Pal Singh of the Economic Faculty along with the other faculties, has been organising `Green Revolution Game' for the different courses run at the Academy. The Game's primary aim is to sensitise the trainees to the rural economy and decision making by farmers under uncertainties.

Professor Atindra Sen remained the co-ordinator of the Economics Faculty.

Professor Brij Pal Singh, was the Counsellor for Punjab Cadre, IAS Officer Trainees.

#### Administrative and Other Functions

Dr. Brij Pal Singh has been serving as Director's Nominee for Society for Social Service, Director's Nominee for Employees Welfare Fund, Administrator for Lalita Shastri Balwadi. He is the elected president of the Upbhokta Shakari Samiti. He is Coordinator of the Village Study Unit. Professor Atindra Sen has been the Member Secretary of the National research and Resource Centre (NRRC) LBSNAA.

### 2.5 FACULTY OF HISTORY AND INDIAN CULTURE

There was a significant shift in the nature of inputs provided under the broad rubric of History and Indian Culture during the Foundational Course. The main premise of the course was that Ots were already aware of a broad and general outline of history and that, hterefore, it was important to demonstrate the manner in which the interpretation of history was of significance to issues that are of contemporary relevance. Simultaneously it attempted to expose the officer trainees to the richness and diversity of our cultural heritage and to create a sense of curiosity and interest in these areas. In view of the above objectives, it was decided that we would discuss the nature of inputs with Indian National trust of Art and Culture Heritage (INTACH) and ask them to coordinate this module for us. The central theme of the module was the issue of cultural identity and within this broad rubic we covered a wide range of subjects.

There were many eminent historians such as Dr. Shahid Amin, Prof of History, Delhi University, Delhi; Dr. Satish Chandra, Prof Emeritus of History, JNU, New Delhi Dr. Mahesh Rangarajan, Fellow Nehru Memorial Museum, New Delhi who participated in the module. Art Historian/Critics such as Shri B.N. Goswamy, Shri Ravi Vasudevan, Fellow, Nehru Memorial Museum, New Delhi; Mr. AGK Menon, Renowned Delhi Based Architect and Shri Rajeev Sethi, Renowned Designer who has had a lot to do with the projection of Indian Culture both in the country and abroad. In the recital and culture performance there was an attempt to expose the Ots to both Karnataka and Hisdustani forms of music and dance.

## 2.6 FACULTY OF POLITICAL THEORY AND CONSTITUTIONAL LAW

The subjects Political theory and Constitutional Law are amongst the core-subjects prescribed for the Foundational Course and IAS Professional Courses. Both are intrinsically inter-disciplinary embracing substantive problem areas of civic society. Apart from an analytical framework both subjects offer a moral language in which to describe and judge political phenomena. An in-depth study of these subjects offer a new angle of vision, a new way of seeing or understanding the apparently contradictory but essentially complementary ideals of liberty and order. It is the

endeavour of the faculty of Political Theory and Constitutional Law to address these issues and make the administrators aware of the challenges and ethos of our plural, democratic, secular and federal polity.

#### Course Inputs

In the Foundational Course, the main objective is to give an overview of 'Indian Political System' to enable trainees to comprehend the basic Constitutional values, Institutional setups, and power, relations between different groups. With a view to sensitize the officer-trainees in the realm of religious tolerance and to make them aware of the cancer of communalism, sessions on the topic "Secularism and Communalism" were continued from last year and covered in great depth during this year.

Important and relevant topics like "Human Rights", "Minorities Rights", and Reservations in Public service" were dealt with both in Political theory as well as in the Constitution of India.

During IAS Professional Course, Phase-I, the emphasis of the discussions focused on the udnerlying causes and processes of our political dynamics. Topics like "Public Protest and Parliamentary Democracy", "Agririan Unrest", "Student Unrest", and "Caste and Communal Unrest", were discussed in length. Officer-trainees are also sensitizsed to the perennial importance of "Civil Liberties/Human rights in India". Further, the symbiotic relationship between the Political Process and Development Process was brought out in the lecture on the topic "Politics of Development".

#### Faculty Development

Professor M. Muthuswamy, Faculty Coordinator, attended a Course on "Advanced Professional Programme in Public Administration" from 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 1995 to 30<sup>th</sup> March, 1996. He was awarded master's Diploma in Public Administration by Indian Institute of Public Administration and M.Phil. Degree in Social Science's from Punjab University.

#### 2.7 FACULTY OF LANGUAGES

In the Academy, the officer trainees learn the languages of their respective cadres during their professional training. Besides Hindi, the Academy provides facilities for imparting training in twelve modern Indian languages specified in the VIII schedule of the Constitution.

Mere lecturing is not the proper tool for language teaching. Discussions, seminars, video films were some instruments which the faculty often used. A good number of Drills and exercises were used in the classes in order to make the Officer Trainees have agood Command over the language, they were required to learn. Classes were also scheduled in the language laboratory.

# 3.1 TRAINING OF TRAINERS COURSE ON DECENTRALISED PLANNING & PANCHAYATI RAJ INSTITUTIONS

Four Training of Trainers Course on Decentralized Planning & Panchayati Raj Institutions were conducted during 1995 from 14th to 25th January, 1995; 24th July to 3rd August, 1995; 4th September to 15<sup>th</sup> September, 1996; and 9<sup>th</sup> October to 20<sup>th</sup> October, 1995 respectively. Seventy four participants attended the programme. Besides the in-house faculty the guest speakers included Shri S.K. Chand IAS (Retd.) Dr. R. Saran, Department of Economics, Ranchi University, ranchi; Shri Y.B. Prasad, Dr. Satpaty; Dr. Ashok Sinha; Col. S. Baxi and Dr. B. Prasad and Smt. Sushma Singh, Jt. Secretary, Ministry of Rural Development, New Delhi and Shri S.K. Ghosh, Under Secretary, DoPT, New Delhi. Dr. H. Ramachandran was the course coordinator in three programmes whereas Dr. H.C. Pokhriyal was Course Coordinator in the fourth programme and Dr. Anil Kumar Dimri was the Associate Course Coordinator in all the Programmes. The course on training of trainers in Decentralised Planning & Panchayati Raj Institutions (17th - 25th January, 1995) was organised at Sri Krishna Institute of Public Administration, Ranchi (Bihar) and Shri Nagendra Prasad was the local Coordinator.

# 3.2 MICRO-PLANNING FOR SUSTAINBALE DEVELOPMENT (13<sup>TH</sup> TO 24<sup>TH</sup> FEBRUARY, 1995)

A two week training programme on Micro-Planning for Sustainable Development was jointly organised by the Centre for Micro Planning and Regional Studies and the Centre for Sustainable Development from 13<sup>th</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> February, 1995. The programme aimed at acquainting the participants with the concepts of sustainable development planning, assessing the sustainability level of existing micro-level planning, establishing the relationship of people, particularly women with sustainable development issues, evolving a viable framework for linking the government, NGOs, Private organisations and the people for managing sustainable development programmes, acquiring the techniques for monitoring sustainability and and identifying appropriate technology and institutional packages for sustainable development. The course was attended by 12 participants from Central and State government departments and the Administrative training Institutes. The Department of personnel and training, Government of India sponsored the coruse. Shri PMV Siromony was the coordinator and Smt. Nira Ramachandran was the associate co-ordinator.

### 3.3 TRAINING COURSES ON SUPERVISION OF DPEP

Three training course on Supervision of District Primary Education Programme were conducted from  $22^{nd}$  February to  $2^{nd}$  March;  $24^{th}$  to  $30^{th}$  May, 1995 and  $30^{th}$  October to  $4^{th}$  November, 1995. Fifty three participants attended the programme. The

course content and design were structured in such a way that by the end of course participants were able to (I) understand the developments in the context of universalization of elementary education with emphasis on the shifts in the education policy; (ii) identify the scope of functional differentiation and decentralisation in implementing local strategies and plans for achieving DPEP goals; (iii) analyse the issues pertaining to primary education and understand the functional linkages of DPEP; (iv) develop analytical and descriptive skills pertaining to identification and analysis of significant parameters of DPEP; and (v) supervise the programme and prepare an effective aide memoir. # 3.4 WORKSHOP TO DICUSS THE MANUAL ON DECENTRALISED PLANNING UNDER FAO PROJECT (28<sup>TH</sup> AND 29<sup>TH</sup> FEBRUARY, 1995)

The Centre for Micro-Planning & Regional Studies, LBSNAA, Mussoorie in collaboration with seven other institutions prepared a manual on District Planning (two volumes - Planners and Trainers Guide) under FAO project. # 3.5 WORKSHOP ON CHILDREN IN INDIA (13<sup>TH</sup> TO 15<sup>TH</sup> MARCH, 1995)

A three day workshop on Interventions for the Child was organised in the month of March, 1995 from 13<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup>. 20

Persons participated in the workshop. Problems relating to children were discussed in the context of district specific stragtegies. A book entitled "Rallying round the Child" was developed during the course of this workshop. The book is a compendium on issues relating to children and discussing some successful strategies in meeting various needs of the children. The workshop was funded by the Department of Women and Child, Government of India, New Delhi. The workshop provided on opportunity to the Members of Academy's Faculty to interact with experts on issues relating to children. Two films on Child Labour and Female Infanticide wore also shown to the participating during the course. Special report were prepared on themes like The Girl Child, Child Labour and Educaiton of Unprivileged Groups. Shri Amarjeet Sinha was the coordinator and Prof. A. Santhosh Mathew was the Associate Coordinator for this Workshop.

## 3.6 TWENTY SEVENTH REGIONAL SCIENCE CONFERENCE (20<sup>TH</sup> AND 21<sup>ST</sup> MARCH, 1995)

Twenty Seventh Reginal Science Conference was organised from 20 to 21<sup>st</sup> March, 1995 by the Centre for Micro-Planning & Regional Studies in collaboration with Reginal Science Association of India. The main theme of the conference was Liberalisation and decentralisation. The main theme was further divided into sub-themes namely conceptual issues, impact of liberalisation on regional economies, impact on environment and implications for sustainable development. Forty participants (34 external and six internal faculty members) participated in the Conference. The participants were mainly from Universities, research and training institutions and government organisations.

Thirteen states were represented in the Conference and 20 papers were presented and discussed in detail in different technical sessions.

## 3.7 GENDER PLANNING TRAINING PROGRAMME (3<sup>RD</sup> APRIL TO 5<sup>TH</sup> MAY, 1995)

A five weeks Gender Planning Training Programme was held at the Academy from 3<sup>rd</sup> April to 5<sup>th</sup> May, 1995. 26 Participants including 8 women from Central and State Governments officers attended. Dr. N.C. Saxena, Director delivered the inaugural address. The main aim of the GPTP is to establish gender issues as a priority concern in developemnt initiatives. It seeks to focus on the need not only to reduce the inequalities between men and women, but also to stress the importance for greater equity and within this framewrok highlights the crucial importance of training in bringing about change. It aims at building up a sustainable national gender training resource but also to impact

on planning and policy formulation as its long term objectives. # 3.9 TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR IAS OFFICERS (10-16 YEARS SERVICE (5<sup>TH</sup> TO 23<sup>RD</sup> JUNE, 1995)

24 participants including one woman attended. Dr P.C. Hota, Secretary, Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions delivered the inaugural address and Dr. N.C. Saxena, Director, LBSNAA, Mussoorie delivered the valedictory address. The aim of the course was to familiarise the participants who are likely to take positions at senior levels in Government of India and State Governments in the next few years - with thronging reforms process particularly its impact on various sectors and to orient them to the role expected of them. The main theme was Structural Adjustment with a Human Face. The eminent guest speakers who interacted with the participants included Shri M.B. Khosla, Formerly Member, Railway Board, Shir Rajiv talwar, PS to Minister for Surface Transport, Government of India, Dr. Seshagiri, Director General, NIC, Shri J.L. Bajaj, chairman, ARDCC, Lucknow, Shri S.S. Meenakshi Sundaram, Principal Secretary to Chief Minister, Karnataka.

3.10 IAS PROFESSIONAL COURSE PHAE-II 1993-94 BATCH (12<sup>TH</sup> JUNE TO 11<sup>TH</sup> AUGUST, 1995) The IAS Professional Course Phase-II was organised from 12th June, 1995 to 11th August, 1995 headed by Shri Ashok Thakur, Shri PMV Siromony and Shri Amarjeet Sinha were the Associate Course Co-ordinators. A total of 80 Officer Trainees of the Indian Administrative Service participated, which included 1 officers from Royal Bhutan Civil Service.

The Course Design was based on following aims and objective

- 1. The Course aimed at making the OTs self-sufficient, confident and effective officers, in particular for the posts that they would hold during the first 6 to 8 years of their career, such as those of Sub Divisional Officer, Project Director DRDP/ITDP, Additional Collector, Municipal Commissioner, Executive Officer of a Zila Parishad, ED/MD of a Public Sector Undertaking, Collector etc.
- 2. The basic goal of Phase-II was to develop the competence and confidence in the officer trainees to shoulder and discharge effectively the responsibilities reposed upon them in the first few years of their service. To achieve this goal, the following objectives were set for this Course.
- \* To provide the OTs with an opportunity to reflect on their district training and to develop and deepen their understanding of issues involved in administration;
- \* To develop in the OTs analytical, written and communications skills;
- \* To consolidate the basic knowledge of the OTs relating to procedures in civil, criminal and revenue laws keeping in mind their job requirements as presiding officers of courts;

- \* To consolidate the working knowledge of the probationers in computer application for field administration;
- \* To make the OTs capable of discharging their duties in the official language of the State/Cadre to which they are allotted.
- \* To develop camaraderie and unity within the service through an active campus life;
- \* To keep the OTs in a good physical shape.

#### Strategy and Methodology

The objectives of the Course, listed above, were in conformity with the broad objectives of the entire 2-year probationary training. However, the contents and methodology of training in this Course were different from those in the Foundational Course, Phase-I of the professional course and the 52 week field In the Foundational Course the thrust was on training. interaction among OTs of various services. In Phase-I the emphasis was on theoretical inputs and in field training. With this background training of the OTs, the Phase-II was based largely on experience sharing by the Officer Trainees. The internal faculty as well as the guest faculty were utilised primarily as Co-ordinators and/or resource persons to moderate the perspective wherever such interventions were needed. The Course drew considerably on the learning arrived at in the proceeding phases of training, especially the 52 week field training.

• Participative methods of learning through presentations, group-work, panel discussions, case studies, and exercises;

- Limited lecture sessions;
- Discussions over the assignment written during the field training, including the order written and evidence recorded by the OT as presiding officer of a court;
- Self-learning through extensive use of the Academy Library,
   TRD Cell, Computer Centre, Language Laboratory and such other facilities:
- Practical application of computer task (PACT) in the various branches of the Academy;
- Thematic films, followed by discussion;
- Counsellor Group Meetings;
- Close interaction between faculty and the Ots, both formally and informally;
- Physical training;
- Sports and Extra curricular activities;

At the end of the course a group fo 12 Ots went on a frotnight long high altitude trek to the Zanskar Valley in Laddakh Crossing atleast 6 passes each around 14,000 to 17,000 ft. the passing out/Valedictory Function, was conducted in an formal and dignified manner. This was achieved by an oath-taking ceremony in which the 1970 batch IAS officers were called to participate and requested to distribute the Silver Plaques to each of the Ots symbolising the continuity of the Service and LBSNAA

3.11 NATIONAL WORKSHOP ON ROLE AND FUNCTIONS OF STATE FINANCE COMMISSIONS (1<sup>ST</sup> AND 2<sup>ND</sup> JULY, 1995)

The 61<sup>st</sup> Foundational Course was held from 4<sup>th</sup> September to 15<sup>th</sup> December, 1995. The Foundational Course was designed to provide the officer trainees their first introduction to the ethos and

values of higher civil services especially values of integrity, humanism, service and professionalism. It aimed to in introduce the officer trainees to various aspects of Indian social reality, especially the problems of the most vulnerable sections. And finally, it aimed at building comradeship, an espirit de corps among officers of various services, a perception that although their specific roles may be different, they are partners in the wider enterprise of public service.

Academic inputs were provided through six subject streams viz: Administration, Public Law, Basic **Economics** Administrators, Management and Behavioural Sciences, Indian History and Culture and Political Concepts and Constitution of India. In addition, a major emphasis is put on hands on Computer work. Both lecture and participative methodologies are used, with a preference for the latter. A major strength of this Foundational Course was that it encouraged the officer trainees to make small but significant social interventions in defined sectors in the surrounding community, both within and outside the campus. This has done a great deal to help build among the trainees awareness and concern for the underpriviledged. The sincerity and commitment with which the officer trainees have intervened for improving the balwadi and school, for providing alternate livelihoods to mess employee's families, for planning night shelters and intervening in nearby villages, afforestation and environmental improvement Mussoorie and so on, have all been extremely significant. When strapped for funds for some social interventions, there are some groups which have voluntarily pooled their own money for this purpose. For the first time, this batch organised an evening of thanks-giving, Shukriyana, for the room and mess employees, cleaning staff, rooms from the horse stables, and other class IV staff and their families. As they served them food and cleaned the dishes after they left, it was with a spirit of genuine respect and affection for the working employees. An unprecedented health camp for the urban poor of Mussoorie was organised in which over 600 people were examined and many major illnesses diagnosed. And 48 years after India's Independence and 36 years after the Academy came into existence in Mussoorie, the officer trainees worked hard to bring an end to the system of slavery of hand pulled rickshaws in Mussoorie.

The course design also placed significant emphasis on structured, elective, extra and co-curricular modules. The objective was to widen horizons and open new windows for the officer trainees and to offer training opportunities to gain some proficiency in depth in some areas of their choice outside the work. The modules that were offered range from theatre and film making, cinema appreciation, skills with one's hands in automobile repair, painting, cooking, first-aid, media and communication, etc. In the module on personal life skills; officer trainees were given the opportunity oto introspect and prepare themselves for harmonising their personal lives with their official lives. As in previous years, the course included two important external programmes, viz. The village study programme and the trek. The villages that where visited were located in 16 districts of UP (Tehri-Garhwal, Chamoli, Mirzapur), MP (Sidhi, West Nimar (Khargone), Jhabua, Raigarh, Gwalio), Bihar (Palamau, Purnia, West Singhbhum, Nawada, Khagaria, madhubani) and rajasthan (Banswara, Rajasmand). The officer trainees also undertook a 9

days trek in Himalayas which was a major learning experience in interpersonal relations, humanism, courage, endurance and love and respect for nature.

# 3.18 REGIONAL SEMINAR ON HILL AREA DEVEOPMENT ( $6^{TH}$ TO $8^{TH}$ SEPTEMBER, 1995)

The Regional Seminar on Hill Area Development was held at the Academy from 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> September, 1995. This seminar was funded by ODA with the main purpose of looking into the issues and problems in hill areas and providing an opportunity to practising bureaucrats, academicians, NGOs, environmentalists, foresters and planners to share these concerns and to come up with concrete recommendations. The seminar was attend by 19 participants from all of the hill states of the country. Broadly speaking the areas dealt were forestry problems of migratory graziers, land use planning, horticulture, sustainable tourism, role of NGOs, shifting cultivation and social capability in sustainable development. The areas reflected in these papers were the hill districts of Uttar Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh and the North-Eastern states of Arunachal Pradesh and Meghalaya in particular.

Shri Ashok Thakur was the coordinator and Smt. Sarojini G. Thakur was the Associate Coordinator.

# 3.19 70<sup>TH</sup> INDUCTION TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR IAS OFFICERS (PROMOTED OR ON

# THE SELECT LIST) 11<sup>TH</sup> SEPTEMBER TO 13<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER, 1995)

The 70<sup>th</sup> Induction Training Programme for IAS Officers (Promoted or on the Select List) was held from 11<sup>th</sup> September to 13<sup>th</sup> October, 1995. 35 participants including two women attended. The main theme was "Reforms in Government and Professionalisation of the Civil Services". The broad focus of the thrust area were All India Perspective, skills for public management, accountability and the human element in administrations, organisational design and processes of state intervention, skill for Effective Administrators and Bharat Darshan.

Some of the eminent persons invited to interact Prof. Shekhar Singh, IIPA, Prof. B.B. Bhattacharya, JNU and Major Gen. M.L. Mandan, Director, DITM, Mussoorie.

Shri Padamvir Singh, Dy. Director (Sr.) was the Course Director and Smt. Nira Ramachandran was the Associate Course Director.

# 3.20 EXACTION GAME (19<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER TO 21<sup>ST</sup> OCTOBER, 1995)

The Exaction Game was held at the Academy from 19<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> october, 1995. 12 participants including 4 women from Central and State Governments officers attended.

Prof. Brijpal Singh was the Coordinator.

# 3.21 71<sup>ST</sup> INDUCTION TRAINING PROGRAME FOR IAS OFFICERS (PROMOTED OR ON THE SELECT LIST) (6<sup>TH</sup> NOVEMBER TO 8<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER, 1995)

The 71<sup>st</sup> Induction Training Programme for IAS Officers (Promoted or on the select list) was held from 6<sup>th</sup> November 8<sup>th</sup> December, 1995. 20 participants including two women attended. The aim of the course was to provide understanding of the All India context and to develop expertise as modern administrator. The main theme was "Changes and Challenges in Government".

Shri N.D. Jayal, IAS (Retd.) delivered the inaugural address and Shri Rajeshwar Prasad, IAS (Retd.) delivered the valedictory address. Some of the eminent persons invited to interact included Shri Rajeshwar Prasad, IAS (Retd.), Shri N.N. Vohra, India International Centre, New Delhi and Shir Amodh Kant, Addl. Commissioner of Police HQ, New Delhi.

Shri Ashok Thakur, Deputy Director (Sr.) was the course Director and Smt. Nira Ramachandran was the Associate Course Director.

# 3.22 TRAINING COURSE ON PLANNING & IMPLEMENTATION OF DPEP

Four training courses on Planning & Implementation of DPEP were conducted from 16<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup> November, 1995; 24<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> November, 1995; 14<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> December, 1995; and 15<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> December, 1995 respectively. Seventy six participants from

Haryana, Maharashtra, Tamilnadu, MP and Kerala attended these programmes. The course content and design were structured in such a way that by the end of course participants were able to (I) understand the developments in the context of universalization of elementary education with emphasis on the shifts in the education policy; (ii) identify the scope of functional differentiation and decentralisation in implementing local strategies and plans for achieving DPEP goals; (iii) analyse the issues pertaining to primary education and understand the functional linkages of DPEP; (iv) develop analytical and skills pertaining to identification, descriptive analysis, sequencing and scheduling of significant parameters of DPEP; and (v) analyse the basic data pertaining to the DPEP Annual Work Plan and budgeting. The eminent guest speakers who interacted with participants included Dr. I.D. Gupta, reader, regional College of Education, Bhopal; Dr. C.S. Nagaraju, Associate Professor, ISEC, Bangalore; Shri S. Mendiratta, Dy. Secretary, Ministry of Rual Development, New Delhi, Dr. Sanjay Chahande, State Project Director (DPEP), Government of Maharashtra, Bombay; Ms. Inge Eichner, Education Programme Coordinator, European Commission, New Delhi.

# 3.23 IAS PROFESSIONAL COURSE PHASE-I 91994-95 BATCH) (17<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER, 1994 TO 2<sup>ND</sup> JUNE, 1995)

The IAS Professional Course Phase-I was organised from 17<sup>th</sup> December, 1994 to 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 1995. A total of 80 officer trainees of the Indian Administrative Service participated, which included 20 women officer trainees. The course design was based

on the conviction, firstly that the Indian Administrative Service is above all a public service, with enormous potential and opportunities to reach out and make a difference to the lives of ordinary people in our country, especially the rural and urban poor. It calls upon the administrator to display exceptional qualities of integrity and moral courage, empathy compassion, leadership, justice and impartiality, rationality and freedom from prejuidice, and commitment to goals of development, equity and social justice. However, along with these attitudes, the administrator must develop a deep and abiding professional competence, to shoulder responsibilities that are staggering in scope and complex in dimensin. This professionalism requires knowledge of the country and its people, of social, political and economic proceses and problems, and of the content and implications of various alternate government policies and programmes. And finally it requires a wide range of skills on the part of the administrator, professional, organisational and interpersonal, relevant to a field career as a development professional, a law and order professional and a facilitator of growth with equity and people's action. It was this complex matrix of attitudes, knowledge and skills that are required by effective public servants that the course design sought to reinforce or contribute to the process of building. The course design was also founded on the belief that the qualities of humanism which we seek to build or reinforce in our officer trainees are aided if he or she develops a multifaceted and fully rounded personality, and a wide range of interests also separate from his or her work. This would also ensure in the future that the officer does not derive his or her self-esteem and satisfaction exclusively from work and also tide over with

equanimity phases of unimportant postings. Therefore, the course design provided opportunities for in-depth familiarisation with many extra-curricular interests of the trainees choice, ranging from theatre, cinema, games, adventure sports, working with one's hands, video film making, first aid, philosophy, writing and so on.

The IAS Phase-I commenced, as it does every year with the winter study tour-cum-Bharat Darshan. This was organised this year in two parts, from 20<sup>th</sup> December, 1994 to 10<sup>th</sup> february, 1995 and 27<sup>th</sup> march, 1995 to 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1995, a total of 57 days. A novel feature of the tour this year was the three days attachment, organised for the first time, with urban NGOs working with marginalised groups such as street children, commercial sex workers and destitute etc. as well as in urban slums. Rural NGO/tribal attachment was organised for the first time in the North-East (Ramakrishna Mission, Itanagar). The most important point of departure was that for the first time a joint law and order module was organised for IAS and IPS officer trainees at the end of the first phase of Bharat Darshan at National Police Academy, Hyderabad. This year, an important departure was made in syndicate group work. In addition to academic subjects, hands on project work involving important interventions in life inside and outside the Academy were introduced, an officer trainees were offered a choice of subject. This proved a major success of the course. Officer trainees effectively intervened in taking the first step in breaking down the century old in human practice of hand pulled rickshaws. They did this by building a personal relationship of trust with the rickshaw pullers, working on alternative technical designs for

cycle rickshaws and processing of their bank loans. Officer trainees built awareness in Mussoorie against environmental degradation from plastics. Housing and nigh shelters for rickshaw pullers, hammaals and mess workers were planned, as well as a cooperative. Literacy activities were also commenced on the campus. Officer trainees also made an incisive analysis of cost effectiveness of the Academy.

### 3.24 DECEMBER, 1996)

A five day module on Effective Communication Skills was conducted for the senior and middle level officers of Government, Public Sector from 21<sup>st</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> December, 1995. The objective of this course were:

- Identify factors responsible for distortions in communication;
- Identify and apply the factors that enhance presentation skills;
- Conduct effective meetings;
- Improve report writing skills; and
- Use and apply visual aids, computer, power point etc. to make effective presentations.

This course was attended by 21 people from different areas. Shri K.K. Sharma was the coordinator.

#### 4. TRAINING AND RESEARCH UNITS

# 4.1 CENTRE FOR COOPERATIVES AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (CCRD)

The Centre for Co-operatives and Rural Development (CCRD) was established at the LBS National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie in September 1995 to support the trianing and research activities in the areas of co-operative and rural development areas.

The Centre has identified the following objectives:

- \* To undertake research in the area of co-operatives, especially the interface with RD Institutions like the DRDAs, Line departments and Panchayati Raj Institutions.
- \* To study the difficulties faced by the rural poor in organising themselves into coops' or self help groups, and suggest remedial policy steps to State Governments and the Registrars of Cooperative Societies.
- \* To study the successful interventions by co-operatives and Rural Development Institutions in the poverty reduction programmes of the government and the voluntary groups and NGOs.
- \* To develop case studies, teaching aids, and field visit programmes to impart training in the area of co-operatives and rural development to the officers of the IAS and other

Class I services who attend the Foundation Course and the Professional Courses at the Academy.

- \* To offer courses in the above areas to other In-service
  Training Programmes organised at the Academy from time to
  time, and
- \* To provide support to the National Research and Resource Centre of the Academy, and other research centres like the CSD, CEMPRES, SOFTRAIN, Village Study Unit, Land Reform Unit, Centre for Gender Studies and the Centre for Social Justice in their interdisciplinary research and teaching inputs.

#### **MONOGRAPHS**

- Dairy Development: The path ahead: This monograph on the comparative study of dairying under OF and Non-OF model was commissioned by the Centre. The report was prepared by Shri G.K. Sharma, Former Managing Director of the MP Milk Federation.
- Positive Stroks: This is a quarterly News Letter of the Centre. The main objective of this publication is to highlight positive experience and interventions of Co-operatives and Rural Development agencies in developed function of Rural Development Project.
- CCRD Update: This is bi-monthly documentation from the Centre brings together news, views and reviews and the signs concerning co-operatives and rural development. The theme covered in CCRD Update include Sugar, Fertiliser, handlooms, Agro Product, Cotton Coffee, Housing, Dairy

Development, Agro-based Industries, Cooperative banks, NABARD, Rural Women, Credit & Savings, Liberalisation.

# 4.2 CENTRE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT (CSD)

The Centre for Sustainable Development is a training cum research unit which aims to sensitise administrators to Sustainable Development issues through various environment friendly training modules, experience sharing and case studies; and to also undertake research activities for developing paradigms in the concerned area. The Centre is being funded by SIDA.

## Training and Workshops

The Centre organised a workshop on "Sustainable Development in the Hill Areas" in the Academy from 6-8 September 1995. The Centre proposes to conduct a workshop in June, 1996 on 'Status of Primary Schooling in India' in which noted academicians and researchers of National and International repute would be invited to prepare a complete agenda and plan of action related to primary schooling with the fund support from SOFTRAIN. A 5 day training programme on 'Sustainable Cities for Urban Managers' is proposed for June 1996, in collaboration with the CEMPRES and fund support from the Ministry of Urban Affairs.

#### 1. RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

The Centre under the collaborative project with Indian Social Institute and Centre for Development Economics, New Delhi is conducting a field survey on primary schooling in the Hindi speaking states of UP, MP, HP, Rajasthan and Bihar which aims to probe the status of primary schooling in Northern India and the report would be ready by June 96. Subsequently, similar endeavour would be undertaken in Southern India.

The Centre is working on state specific 'Status of Education in Villages' as reflected in the socio-economic surveys conducted by the Officer Trainees. Presently, the report on tamil Nadu is ready for draft comments.

The Centre brings out a CSD Paper Series that shares the field experiences of the districts and the copies are circulated to the district level functionaries.

# 4.3 CENTRE FOR MICRO-PLANNING AND REGIONAL STUDIES (CEMPRES)

The Study Group on training for District Planning of the Planning Commission, Government of India, New Delhi (1989), recommended that LBSNAA has to be developed into a principal

training Centre for training the officers of higher civil services in India in the area of Decentralised Planning, New Delhi. To enlarge its scope and operations, the unit was renamed as the Centre for Micro-Planning and Regional Studies (CEMPRES) in October, 1992.

### Training Programme

The Centre has organised: (1) four Training Programme on Decentralised Planning and Panchayati Raj Institutions, (2) four Training Course on Supervision of District Primary Education Programme, (3) four Training Courses on Planning and Implementation of District Primary Education Programme. About 240 participants were trained in the above training programmes.

### Workshops

The Centre has organised three Workshops during the calendar year. Decentralised Planning Workshop was organised in February, 1995. Participants of the Workshop included the faculty members/faculty heads of the ATIs besides participants from IGNOU. District Planning Manual prepared by Academy in collaboration with FAO, Rome was adopted as Planning Guide for Decentralised Planning Courses sponsored by DOPT.

The Twenty Seventh Regional Science Congress was organised from 20<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> March, 1995. The main theme of the workshop was "Liberalisation and Decentralisation". Forty participants from Universities, IITs and Training Institutions participated in

the Workshop. Eighteen papers were presented and discussed in the workshop.

A workshop on Role and Functions of State Finance Commission was organised from 1<sup>st</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1995. About 80 participants from different states participated in the workshop. The participants also presented status paper of their states.

#### Research Activities

A Study to develop typology of districts in India based on large number of district parameters has been undertaken by the Centre. Analysis using GIS for UP is complete and awaiting publication. Under Gandhi Block Scheme, Integrated Area Development Plan for Chakrata Block was prepared by the Centre for UP State Government.

### **Publications**

Planning Manual prepared in collaboration with FAO, Rome was published by FAO, Rome. Based on Workshop on New Economic Policy organised by the Centre, book entitled Dimensions of New Economic Policy is being published by concept in two volumes. Besides, these a number of articles were published by the faculty of the Centre in various professional journals.

4.4 CENTRE FOR DEVELOPMENT OF
SOFTWARE FOR TRAINING OF
ADMINISTRATORS (SOFTRAIN)

A Centre for the Development of Software for Training of Administrators (SOFTRAIN) has been set up at Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, not only for creation, but also collection and dissemination of appropriate training software.

Some case studies have also been translated into Hindi and a volume of such case studies will be brought out shortly.

### 4.5 LAND REFORMS UNIT (LRU)

The Land Reforms Unit during the period under reference was functioning under the Chairmanship of Prof. Harsh Mander, Professor of Public Administration and Social Management. Dr. P.S. Datta was coordinator of the Unit up to November 1995. The Unit is supported by a Senior Computer Programmer, Assistant Professor, Research Associate, Data entry operator and other clerical staff. The chairman and the professor actively associated themselves in the Phase-I and Phase-II courses of the IAS Officer Trainees and the Foundational Courses for Group A Central Services as also in various in-service and Induction Courses to cover the areas of land systems and land reforms through lectures, exercises and group discussions.

The other activities undertaken by the Land Reforms Unit during the year under report are as follows:

# Reports

The Land Reforms Unit has already published All India Reports on the basis of empirical study of implementation of land reforms. A third such report is under preparation.

A Workshop on Dynamics and Implications of Agrarian revolution in Punjab and Haryana (January 16-18, 1995) was organised at Chandigarh. A Workshop on Land Reforms: Agenda for North-East (April 03-05, 1995) was organised at Guwahati.

In order to widely disseminate the findings of these Workshops/Seminars, Land Reforms Unit has entered into an agreement with SAGE Publications, New Delhi, on the publication of a series of State-specific Volumes on Land Reforms. ### 4.7 VILLAGE STUDY UNIT (VSU)

The Village Study Unit was initially started to organise Village Study Programmes of Foundation Course and evaluate socio-economic studies done by Officer Trainees during their training programmes. But now, after 5 years of its existence, the tasks and challenges assigned to the unit has given a new life and impetus and is currently diversifying itself towards more microstudies pertaining to rural development.

### Village Study Programme

Questionnaires have been designed for the officer-trainees for collecting information during their district training and their village study reports will be now based on household surveys. The data to be generated by the 194 batch of officer-trainees during their district training will be based on rural development programmes. We are also publishing case-studies on rural development programmes carried out by officer-trainees over the last few years.

The unit has been given a funding by the Ministry of Rural Areas and Employment to use the socio-economic survey work of the Officer-Trainees. Faclty members, academicians and administrators were invited to prepare state papers based on these socio-economic studies reports. We propose to bring out these states specific reports based on socio-economic studies for

the last 10 years and secondary reading about the state in the form of separate volumes and negotiations with the publishers are going on. The following reports have been submitted to the unit for the publication so far:

The Ministry of Rural Areas and Employment vide letter no. 11018/12/93-Policy, Dated 10.6.94, has entrusted the unit to provide feedback on Rural Development Programmes based on socio-economic surveys conducted by the Officer trainees during their training programme. ### 5. LIBRARY

The Academy has one of the most prestigious and well stacked Libraries in the country. It is located in a scenic surroundings in the new building "Karmashila". The north-eastern wing of the building gives a panoramic view of the majestic Himalayas and an eternal sense of togetherness with the nature. The Library is aptly named after Mahatma Gandhi as "Gandhi Smriti Library".

**Document Resources -** The library has around 1.5 Lakh documents including bound Volumes of Journals. The Library added 3087 publications in its holding during the period under report.

The details of the newspaper, periodicals received in the Library are as - Journals subscribed - 208, Journals received on Exchange basis - 53, Journals received on complimentary basis-17, National daily Newspapers - 14, Regional daily Newspapers - 24, Popular Magazines - 27, Regional Magazines - 20, Children Magazines - 6, Children Newspaper - 1.

In addition, the Library receive 44 News letters published by various national and international organisations/ institutions on complimentary basis.

**Services** - Apart from providing lending, reference and photocopying services to the readers, the Library is bringing out 4 current awareness service viz. (i) Current Content Service-fortnightly (ii) List of New Additions - Bi-monthly (iii) Kitab - monthly indexing service of book reviews and (iv) Samayaki - weekly indexing service of newspaper articles.

**Press Clippings** - Library is maintaining press clippings of selected newspaper articles. Photocopies of the articles are provided to the Faculty and other readers on demand. Around 4000 articles are added annualy in this collection.

**Bibliography and Documentation Services** - Library is providing comprehensive literature search to the readers and preparing selected reading lists on various subjects regularly.

**Computerisation -** The library is maintaining various Data bases for information retrieval viz. - CAT - on-line catalogue of library

holdings, 3087 records were added during the year in the data base; INSER- data base created for the selective Journals articles, 4214 records were added during the year in the data base; NEWSCO- data base created for the newspaper articles, 5753 records were added during the year in the data base; AUDCON - data base for Audio- Cassettes collection and VIDCON- data base for the Video Collection of the Library.

**Professional Development-** To keep the Library staff abreast with the latest development in the field, staff members were deputed for attending the ILA and IASLIC conference as well as IIM, Lucknow for Library training during the year.

For policy and other Library development matters, Library has a Library Review and Development Committee. The constitution of the Committee is LRDC met twice in April and November, 1995 for discussing various matters.

Another significant community intervention

related to a campaign against plastics and for afforestation for the environmental health of the environs of Mussoorie. Within the campus, the officer trainees sought to provide supplimentary livelihoods to the families of the mess employees. They also brought about significant improvement in the balwadi and primary school located near the campus.
