Introduction

The Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, India is the apex training institution in the country for the members of the civil services. Its foremost task is to impart training to members of the Indian Civil Services in a common Foundation Course for the All India Services and the Central Services Group-A as-well-as professional training to regular recruits of the Indian Administrative Service (IAS). The Academy also conducts in-service training courses for middle to senior level members of the IAS and officers promoted to the IAS from the state civil services. It offers a range of specialised inputs for a diverse clientele. Individuals, Non-Governmental Organisations, the corporate sector, and Governments both within India and abroad are offered customised courses, which cater to their research and training requirements.

Brief History

It was on April 15, 1958 that the then Home Minister announced in the Lok Sabha, a proposal to set up a National Academy of Administration where training in foundational and fundamental subjects would be given to all the recruits of the senior grades of service. The Ministry of Home Affairs decided to amalgamate the IAS Training School, Delhi and the IAS Staff College, Shimla to form a National Academy of Administration at Mussoorie. The Academy started in Mussoorie, a hill station at a height of a little over 2000 metres just 35 Km. by road from the railhead at Dehradun. The Academy was housed in the prestigious 'Charleville Hotel' built around 1870. This provided the location and initial infrastructure for the Academy. There have been subsequent expansions. Several new buildings have been constructed and others acquired over the years.

Name & Title

Initially the Academy was called the National Academy of Administration'. Its status was an 'Attached Office' of the Government of India under the Ministry of Home Affairs. (GOI, MHA's letter No. 29/47/59-AIS (I) dated 26/12/59). In October 1972, its name was changed to 'Lal Bahadur Shastri Academy of Administration' (GoI Notification No. 32/102/72-Trg. Dt.

13.11.72). In July 1973, the word `NATIONAL` was added and the Academy is now known as the `Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration'. (GOI Notification No. 32/102/72-Trg.. (Vol.I&II) dated 5.7.73).

Campus

The Academy is spread over three sprawling campuses: Charleville, Glenmire and Indira Bhawan. Each has its own specific orientation. Charleville caters to induction-level training as well as customised courses, Glenmire houses the National Institute of Administrative Research (NIAR), a Research & Development wing of the Academy and the Indira Bhawan campus offers facilities for in-service training, other specialised courses, programmes,

workshops and seminars. The courses run on the main campus are the Foundation Course, the IAS Professional Course Phase-I and the IAS Professional Course Phase-II.

Strategy for Training

The effort of the Academy is to help create a bureaucracy that commands respect by performance rather than through position. We interpret the Constitutional mandate for civil servants as one that promotes empathy for the underprivileged, commitment to the unity and integrity of the nation; a promise to uphold integrity and impeccable character in a manner that they appear as role models for the large number of subordinates working with them and for society at large; a respect for all castes, creeds, religion; and, a professional competence that makes the battle against poverty the ultimate objective of every civil servant. At a time when nations are going global in the processes of liberalisation and economic reforms, it is our endeavour to make young civil servants realise the need of upholding enlightened national interest in their interface with the world at large. We also try to learn from the experiences of bureaucracies that have helped in the achievement of economic progress, growth with equity, and human wellbeing in other countries.

Courses

A brief outline of various courses is given as under:

The Foundational Course is essentially knowledge centred; the professional programmes are fundamentally skill oriented and the In-Service courses are mainly directed towards enhancement of policy formulation capabilities for assuming senior positions in Government.

Foundation Course (15 weeks)

This course is meant for members of the All India Services, the Indian Administrative Service, the Indian Police Service, the Indian Forest Service and the various Central Services (Group - `A'). It is run twice a year: The winter one from September to December and the Summer one from March to June. The course aims at imparting a basic understanding of the constitutional, political, socio-economic and legal framework of the country; and also to foster greater coordination among the members of the different public services by building esprit-de-corps and cultivating a spirit of co-operation and inter-dependence. We endeavour to make the Officer Trainees professional in their approach and aware of the challenges and opportunities within the civil service. As the Officer Trainees are new entrants in the Government, we seek to familiarise them with the environment of political, economic, social and administrative issues, through a well-defined syllabus.

IAS Professional Course, Phase-I (24 weeks)

After completion of the Foundation course, the IAS Officer Trainees undergo the Professional Course Phase-I. This aims to develop and hone their professional skills in handling large range of responsibilities that an officer shoulders within the first ten years of service. The course seeks to strengthen the understanding of the environment in which an IAS Officer has to function. It helps to develop values, ideals and attributes desirable in an officer belonging to the IAS. Emphasis is laid on understanding of public systems and their management, together with grounding in Public Administration, Law, Economics and Computer Applications. During Phase-I, the IAS Officer Trainees are sent on a winter study tour-cum-Bharat Darshan comprising of a number of attachments such as; the three Armed Forces, the public sector, the private

sector, municipal bodies, voluntary agencies and Non Government Organisations. The winter study tour ends with an attachment to the Bureau of Parliamentary Studies and Training (BPST) where Officer Trainees get an opportunity to meet parliamentarians and various other dignitaries in the Capital.

These attachments give the officers an opportunity to experience the diverse mosaic of our country. They also get an opportunity to see and understand closely the functioning of various organisations. Thereafter, the officers go through to a regimen of classroom training. It is here that professional inputs in Public Administration, Management, Law, Computer and Economics are given in accordance with the syllabi approved by the Government of India. On completion of the Phase-I course, the Officer Trainees are sent for one year district training.

District Training (52 weeks)

Through this training the Officer Trainees learn about the various facets of administration at the district level. During this period they remain under the direct control of the District Collector and the State Government and get an opportunity to have first hand knowledge of the work of the Collector/ District Magistrate and various other institutions in the state government. They may also opportunity of holding independent aet charge Tehsildar/Mamlatdar, Sub Divisional Magistrate, Development Officer, District Development Officer, Chief Executive Officer of Municipality etc. The Officer Trainees are required to carry out a few assignments given by the Academy, based on field studies in the District. The Counsellors nominated by the Academy for the various cadres remain in touch with the Officer Trainees through correspondence, field visits to their districts and contact with their Collectors.

IAS Professional Course, Phase-II (6 weeks)

While theoretical concepts are sought to be imparted in the Foundation and Phase-I courses, ground level realities are studied during the district training. The Phase-II is the time to share experience gathered across the country, as all the Officer Trainees return to the Academy from different districts in India. The course content of Phase-II is designed for consolidating the learning and assimilating the district experiences gained by the Officer Trainees over one year in the field during attachments in the state and at district level with the theoretical constructs taught earlier. It gives an opportunity to Officer Trainees to re-examine the field realities vis-à-vis theoretical inputs provided in the Academy. The Phase-II course specifically aims to provide an

opportunity to trainees to reflect on their district training so as to understand the issues involved in administration. This gives them an awareness of problems and situations they will face in the initial years of their career.

In-Service Courses

The Academy conducts one or more of the three slotted courses for in-service training of IAS Officers who have put in a number of years in the IAS. Three different courses are conducted for:

- i. IAS officers with 17-20 years of seniority,
- ii. IAS Officers of 10-16 years seniority and;
- iii. IAS officers of 6-9 years seniority.

Induction courses are conducted for officers on the select list or promoted to the IAS. The aims of the in-service courses are to update levels of knowledge, skills and information and to provide opportunities for exchange of ideas, views and experiences with people who have developed expertise in different sectors of national development. Considerable focus is given to new managerial thoughts, techniques, and skills as well as to frontier areas of technology and its management. There is an emphasis on giving the induction course participants an all-India perspective. In addition, one-week vertical integration courses are also conducted on specific themes.

Seminar / Workshops

A number of seminars/ workshops are organised in specific subject areas. Experts/academicians are invited to participate and interact with the participants of various courses. In addition, the Academy also conducts courses in training methodology to upgrade and sharpen the skills of its faculty, as well as the faculty of various, Central and State Training Institutions.

Professionalism

We believe that the voyage of public service is a hazardous one. It is for the civil servants to make a clear choice if they want to live with respect, dignity and honour. We highlight accountability in the eyes of the people and in one's own self-esteem as the greatest badge of honour. The ability to work effectively depends on professional abilities and a commitment to constitutional values. As a country, we implement one of the largest rural employment programs and our effort is to professionally equip the civil servants seek support from the Panchayati Raj Institutions and facilitate participation of the people. Motivating subordinates is a critical

area for all administrators and our effort is to equip them with competencies that can provide such leadership. The use of Participatory Rural Appraisal techniques to seek participation of people and the use of participatory training methodologies in motivating field functionaries are some innovations that have been tried out.

Attachments with the Army, Navy and the Air Force expose the young administrators to the defence related issues and gives them a close view of functioning of our security forces in forward areas. A National Security Essay Competition is also held in collaboration with the Army.

Personality Development

In order to promote an all round development of the personality, a great deal of emphasis is placed on outdoor events. Besides treks in the Himalayas, physical training, cross-country run, Yoga, horse riding, river rafting, para gliding and pistol shooting are some of the activities that the Officer Trainees engage themselves in. Exposure to public speaking, theatre workshops, motor mechanics, gardening, photography and music appreciation are other co-curricular activities offered to the young administrators. An opportunity to learn games from coaches of the Sports Authority of India is also provided.

Curriculum

To ensure that our academic curriculum is relevant, it is periodically reviewed and updated. This is done through the mechanism of consultations with the State Governments, feedback of course participants and the recommendations of the Standing Syllabus Review Committee. The representatives of the Central Government department are also consulted from time to time. The conventional classroom lecture methodology being not the most effective mode to make an impact on attitudes and values of trainees. We have adopted several new methodologies. Most courses operate on a modular structure, whereby, relevant themes are chosen and dealt with, in a consolidated fashion to ensure that all aspects relating to them are addressed.

A module consists of all or some of the following methodologies:-

- 1. Lectures by both in-house and guest faculty.
- 2. Panel discussion to promote divergence of opinions and views.
- 3. Case study.
- 4. Film.

- 5. Group discussion.
- 6. Simulation exercise.
- 7. Seminar.
- 8. Moot Court and Mock Trial.
- 9. Order and judgement writing practice.
- 10. Practical demonstration.
- 11. Problem solving exercise.
- 12. Report Writing (Term Paper, Syndicate Paper)
- 13. Team Work.
- 14. Field visit:
 - a. Trek to the Himalayas In conditions of adversity, bad weather, insufficient accommodation and limited access to food items, the true mettle of the Officer Trainee is tested. This brings out the best and worst in them.
 - b. Visit to villages in backward districts to understand the problems and the true realities of village life.

Values

LBSNAA seeks to impart to civil servants exemplary attitudes and values expected in public services. The skills and knowledge required by a professional civil servant are relatively easier to impart, and these have traditionally been the strength of the Academy. However, to positively influence in the brief period available to us, the attitudes and values of intelligent young persons in their mid-twenties, coming from a wide variety of backgrounds, is a daunting task.

It is generally argued that for public service one needs integrity, moral courage, empathy with and respect for the underprivileged, and freedom from any sectarian prejudices based on religion, region, caste, class or gender. But today, it is precisely these very values that are under siege..

To nurture these values, the Officer Trainees are encouraged to participate in diverse social activities. They are given responsibilities for improving the Lalita Shastri Balwadi School, where LKG/UKG & Class-I are conducted at a concesional rate for the children of the employees and the public. In the school nearly 100 children are enrolled. The problem of solid waste management has also been addressed by them in close coordination with NGOs working in Mussoorie. Employees and their families have been taught to segregate waste. Plastic waste is collected and sent for re-cycling to Dehradun. The rag pickers too earn a living out of this. Waste generated through fused bulbs, tubes and other paper waste generated by the Academy is sent for recycling.

Another effective method has been the use of theatre, which includes street theatre to demonstrate and discuss values. Renowned street theatre groups have been invited to stage plays on communalism, corruption and other topical concerns. These have been well received.

In every major course, Officer Trainees are encouraged to donate blood. A regular health camp is organised for urban and rural poor of Mussoorie on every Thursday. We have found that the young officer trainees have responded very favourably to these measures, and their innate idealism has been strengthened and reinforced.

Interaction with Senior Officers

The Academy has a tradition of inviting senior IAS officers to interact with the Officer Trainees in the Phase-II programme. It gives the Officer Trainees an insight into the challenges to be faced by them in the days ahead. The young recruits discuss the complexities of Government functioning and the important issues facing bureaucracy.



The Academy Spirit



Faculties

Faculty of Public Administration and Social Management

There is a conscious attempt in the Academy to attract faculty from various services and backgrounds so that they bring with them the knowledge of the latest development in their respective field. The subject of Public Administration forms a key input in all the training courses organised in the Academy. The faculty of Public Administration and Social Management plays an important role in all the training courses. Since most of the faculty members are here on deputation, there is a constant updating of knowledge and information, particularly from the field.

The Joint Director is the Coordinator of Public Administration Faculty but the post is vacant since January, 2003.

The Public Administration Faculty has a strength of 10 Deputy Directors. The names of the faculty are as follows:

Apart from their responsibilities in imparting training on subject specific inputs and organising and coordinating training courses and programmes, the members of the Public Administration faculty also carry out different administrative tasks within the Academy like, Establishment, Estates, Supplies & Stores, Accounts, Finance & Budget, Library, Dispensary, Computers, Electronic and Maintenance, Protocol, and Outdoor Activities.

Faculty of Management

Considering the ever-increasing need to educate the administrators in management concepts, tools and techniques, an independent faculty of Management was created in 1989. There is now emphasis on management techniques successfully adopted in the private sector and equally applicable in government. The Management Faculty attempts at applying management concepts in the context of the government. This context is defined not only with respect to the administration in the secretariat of the various State Governments and Union Government but also with respect to administration in smaller administrative units, DRDAs, development programmes and projects.

The course content with respect to Management is designed keeping in mind the training needs of the participants. Accordingly, the emphasis during the Foundation Course is on exposing the participants to basic concepts in the area of organizational behaviour, statistical methods of data analysis, project management and financial management. During the Phase-I of the IAS Professional Course, Officer Trainees are trained in the basic skills of financial management, Project Management, Management of Development and Social Marketing. In addition, modules on Communication Skills, MIS and Monitoring of Social Sector Programmes are conducted.

During the In-service training programmes, the Management Faculty conducted specially development and designed sessions on "Total Quality Management in Government", "New Public Management" and "Project & Financial Management". It has been networking with other leading institutes to upgrade the course contents and pedagogy of these sessions.

A workshop on 'Revision of Syllabus of Management' for the Foundation Course, IAS Phase-I and IAS Phase – II held on 30th – 31st October, 2003.

The Faculty of Management was co-ordinated by Shri Manoj Ahuja. Management inputs were also given by Shri M.H. Khan, Shri Rajiv Ranjan Mishra; Shri T.K. Manoj Kumar and Smt. Arti Ahuja besides eminent guest faculty.

Faculty of Law

Law is an important input to the trainee officers in all the courses. The Law input aims at not only imparting the requisite knowledge and skill but also in building the right kind of attitude leading to

the commitment and conviction for the Rule of Law, Principles of Natural Justice and Human rights.

In the Foundation courses we give a general idea about the Law and legal concepts like Rule of Law, Natural Justice and Judicial system etc. The input not only covers the substantive law relating to Contracts and Torts and Penal Law but also covers the procedural Law both in the Civil and Criminal spheres. A general outline is also given in regard to the Law of Evidence. In the Professional Courses the emphasis is given more on "doing" rather than on "knowing". The Officer Trainees of the Professional Course are imparted the skills and techniques as to how they should function as a Court and handle legal and administrative matters more particularly when such matters are judicial or quasi-judicial in nature. Both substantive and procedural laws are covered in depth. Some skill oriented sessions in the form of Order Writing Exercises, Mock Trial and Moot Court etc. are also held. In the Inservice courses the emphasis is more on interaction and imparting skills aimed at professional excellence in legal matters besides the contemporary issues like Human Rights and Judicial Activism.

Law faculty was coordinated by Shri Dibyajyoti De, Professor of Law and the faculty included; Shri Dibyajyoti De, Professor of law (joined on 6.3.2003) Shri S. Sajith, Reader in law.

During the year, academic inputs in 'Law' were given by Shri Dibyajyoti De, Shri R.S. Dalal, Shri A.S. Ramachandra, and Shri S.Sajith besides eminent quest faculty.

Faculty of Economics

The basic objective of teaching Economics in the Academy is to acquaint officers with the concepts of Economics and their application in administration. The intention is to equip participants with the essential knowledge of the tools needed to appreciate the impact of economics in real life situations. Considering that economic issues have occupied a very important place in the public administration, a deeper understanding of the subject can help to improve the quality of governance.

During the year, the compilation of articles circulated to the participants in different courses was revised thoroughly keeping in view the latest trends in Indian economy such as impact of globalization, the large and growing foreign currency reserves the precarious condition of state finance etc. New relevant readings were added in the compilation from time to time.

The traditional system of evaluation the Foundation Course was substantially overhauled. Instead of having a final examination, concurrent evaluation was introduced and as many as four exams were held during the 74 Foundation Course. In these exams different methodologies such as objective type test, report writing and essay type question were tried and the feedback from the OTs was very positive. In courses other than Foundation Course stress was placed on practical aspects of Economics as compared to mere Issues like poverty, globalization, changing nature of Indian Economy etc. were highlighted. Expertise of in-house faculty was utilized to the fullest extent and a large number of eminent guest speakers were also called for disseminating knowledge in the area of their expertise. Shri Mukesh Puri coordinated the faculty of Economics with assistance from Mrs. Arti Ahuja.

Faculty of History and Indian Culture

The major activity of the faculty this year was the revision of the syllabus for Indian History and Culture taught in the Foundation Course. A workshop was organized to undertake the revision of the syllabus on Indian History and Culture as a follow up on the decision of the Standing Syllabus Review Committee taken in its Fifth Meeting held on July 6, 2002 directing all the Faculty Coordinators to develop a detailed syllabus or curriculum for the subject in each of the courses conducted by the Academy on August 1 & 2, 2003. 15 historians and history teachers were invited for the workshop and 9 were able to attend. The workshop was also attended by some serving officers and members of the

Academy Faculty. A list of the participants is enclosed. background note was circulated to the participants in advance, along with the existing syllabus for Indian History and Culture in the Foundation Course, the Syllabus for the papers on General Studies in the Civil Services Examination and a list of readings currently circulated to the officer trainees. After detailed deliberations, the workshop suggested extensive revision of the syllabus. A detailed report on the workshop along with the proposed syllabus was submitted to the Training Research and Development Cell. The revised syllabus was then adopted for the 74th Foundation Course. The delivery of Indian History and Culture inputs in the 74th Foundation Course was based on the new syllabus. As decided in the workshop, in view of the vast area to be covered under History and Indian Culture during the Foundation Course, a few lectures were combined with self-preparation. Shri Wajahat Habibullah took sessions on the "Overview of Indian History" and relevance of the study of history for Civil Servants. Renowned historians were also invited to deliver lectures to the Lecture-cum-demonstrations Officer Trainees. extensively used to enable the Officer Trainees were able to imbibe and get a feel of Indian Culture and Art History. A number of lecture-cum-demonstrations on classical dance forms, theatre, folk dances etc were held. Apart from this the Ministry of Culture, Government of India arranged visits of groups from different Zonal Cultural Centres. Faculty of Political Concepts and the Constitution of India

The subject of Political Concepts and Constitution, is one of the core-subjects, prescribed for the Foundation Course, and, the IAS Professional Course. The subject is inter-disciplinary, embracing substantive problem areas of civil society.

In the Foundation Course, the main objective is to give an overview of the Indian political system, to enable the trainees to understand the basic Constitutional Values, the Institutional Context, and, the power relations among different groups.

During the IAS Professional Course (Phase-I), the emphasis is on the underlying causes and processes of political dynamics. Topics such as, Union-State Relations in India, the Working of Parliamentary Democracy in India and Caste Conflicts, etc., were discussed at length. Trainees were also sensitised to the importance of Civil Liberties and Human Rights in India.

During the year, the faculty of Political Concepts and the Constitution of India was coordinated by Shri R.S. Dalal, Professor of Political Theory and Constitutional Law. The faculty also includes A.S. Ramachandra, Reader in Political Theory and Constitutional Law.

Faculty of National Security Affairs

The faculty of National Security Affairs was coordinated by Shri R.S. Dalal, Professor of Political Theory and Constitutional Law.

Faculty of Hindi & Regional Languages

In the Academy, the Officer Trainees learn the languages of their respective cadres during their professional training. Besides Hindi, the Academy provides facilities for imparting training in modern Indian languages specified in the VIII Schedule of the Constitution.

Mere lecturing is not the proper tool for language teaching. Discussions, Seminars, Video films and Audio -tapes were some instruments, which the faculty often used. A good number of drills and exercises were used in the classes in order to make the Officer Trainees have a good command over the language. They were also required to learn through use of audio devices in the language laboratory.

All members of the language faculty prepared and evaluated written response sheets in response to the Distance Learning programme for 2002 batch. Apart from the written assignments an audio-cassette assignment was introduced in the district training module. The self-instructional material was used for all languages in a distance learning mode. Apart from Indian languages, French is taught in the Academy by a French Instructor. The faculty was coordinated by Dr. Prem Shankar and assisted by Shri Mukesh Puri.

Faculty of Computers and Information Systems (NICTU)

NIC Training Unit, LBS National Academy Mussoorie provides Communication and Information Technology related training to the officers of All India Services during all the training programmes conducted at the Academy. The following courses were conducted during the training calendar of 2003.

Course highlights

The 24-week Phase-I course is primarily aimed at developing the requisite skills, knowledge base and appropriate attitudes amongst the officer trainees related to the jobs they would hold in the first decade of service. The course is divided into two parts. The 8-Tour (Bharat Darshan), Winter Study immediately on completion of the Foundation Course, and is intended to give the officer trainees an all India perspective and comprises attachments with the Armed Forces, civil administration in insurgency affected areas, non governmental organizations, private and public sector units, government organizations which applied information effectively and communication technology, urban local bodies and in tribal villages. A mid-Course break of two weeks including a weeklong Bureau of Parliamentary Studies and Training (BPST) attachment was also included in the course.

The 16-week Academic Module held on campus covered the prescribed syllabi through cross disciplinary modules in 323 sessions of about 400 hours of teaching. This year the course objectives which had been continued unchanged for a long time were extensively revised in keeping with the emerging training needs. The training methodology adopted included field visits, case studies, seminars, syndicate work, small group discussions and exercises. Extensive reading material on each of the modules was also circulated. A dual online feedback mechanism of Daily and Weekly Feedback was followed. The course end feedback of the course was also very high. A detailed course report was also brought out, copies of which are available in the library for reference.

Objective and Aims

The following were the issues discussed in the retreat.

National Security

The discussion was organised on sub-topics such as external threat, internal threat, religious divide and naxalism. Various delegates put their valuable points on these crucial issues. Strategic, intelligence and tactical issues were also discussed. It was also mentioned that Good Governance is very much related to National Security. The session was chaired by Mr. C.G. Somiah.

Civil Service Reforms

The discussion was organised on various sub-topics such as Interface with Politicians, Liberalisation Process and Reforms, Poverty, Redressal of Public Grievances and Control of Corruption, Role Models, Ethics and Values and also Role of Academy. All the participants expressed their views based on their vast experience for bringing reforms and new initiatives in Civil Service.

Interaction with IAS Officer Trainees of 2001 Batch

The Officer Trainees of 2001 Batch were fortunate to have interaction with the senior colleagues of the service during Retreat. The Officer Trainees and the participants were clubbed into different groups based on similar cadres. Various issues such as qualities of a Civil Servant, Working in Different Areas, Corruption, Dealing with Politicians, Dealing with Media, Stress Management, Time Management and Career Prospects were discussed in detail.

Good Governance

The session was chaired by Mr. Mani Narayanswami. The concept of Good Governance was discussed in detail. The Perspective of a Common Man, Need for Transparent Administration, Human and Sensitive Administration, Right to Information and Accountability and Socio-economic factors were some of the issues which were discussed in this session.

Corruption: Causes and Control

Ms. Kusum Lata Mittal chaired the session. She mentioned that corruption at the administrative level tends to directly affect the citizens more and hence becomes a crucial issue. Various subtopics such as Bureaucratic Corruption, Political Corruption, Crime and Politics, Lokpal Bill and Control of Corruption were discussed for controlling corruption at the administrative level the group suggested following measures:-

- · reducing age of recruitment into Civil Service;
- specified job duties;
- reducing delays in inquiry process; and
- appropriate and quick punishment

Conclusion

Deliberations in the Retreat were very important and useful. All the participants highly appreciated the design of the Retreat as well as other logistic arrangements. The proceeding of the Retreat were also finalised, edited, printed and later on sent to all participants, Chief Secretaries of State Governments, State ATIs and also to Department of Personnel and Training.

Course highlights

The 2nd Conference of Heads of **Central Training Institutes** was held at LBSNAA, Mussoorie on 15th & 16th September, 2003. In the Conference, the following points were discussed:

- Review of Action Taken on Proceedings of 1st Conference of Heads of CTIs held on 21st & 22nd October, 2002.
- Revised Syllabus of Foundation Course.
- Proposed Mechanism of Feedback from CTI's.
- Weightage given to Foundation Course by different Services.
- Resource Sharing among CTIs.

The broad areas of concern and the suggestions given by the participants were as given below:

- 1. To send a proposal to DoPT regarding weightage given to F.C. Exams for (a) Confirmation in service & (b) Inter-se seniority.
- 2. Professional Courses of different services will be revised keeping in mind the revised Foundation Course Syllabus.
- 3. All Central Training Institutes will give feedback on Foundation Course to LBSNAA after debriefing with the OT's.
- 4. It was decided that all the Central Training Institutes will send the details of their Alumni Associations to other Institutes to promote the spirit of shared responsibility in governance.
- 5. It was decided that suggestions made regarding Foundation Course Syllabus will be incorporated.
- 6. All Central Training Institutes should join in Faculty Development Programmes of DoPT.
- 7. An effort should be made by all the Central Training Institutes to share their resource persons for teaching in another Institutes.
- 8. The conference of the Heads of Central Training Institutes should be organised every year. The host institutes may rotate depending upon volunteers. In case there are no volunteers, LBSNAA will be the host. The conference will not only look at the F.C., but also deliberate upon issues of common interest such as sharing of resource persons and materials, development of training modules, joint training of faculty, faculty development policy, etc. The feedback from the conference can go to the concerned quarters such as the DoPT and the Cadre Controlling Authorities.
- 9. It was decided that the National Database of Trainers being developed by DoPT can be adopted by all the Central Training Institutes. DoPT will circulate format to all Institutes

- for their modification. (b) DoPT will indicate contact Institute in database instead of feedback.
- 10. It was felt that a Panel of Resource Persons comprising of retired professionals can be maintained. It was decided that each Institute can develop expertise on one subject/area.

National Institute of Administrative Research

The Centre for Co-operatives and Rural Development (CCRD) is functioning since September 1995. The CCRD is engaged in conducting research in co-operative sector, studying the difficulties faced by the rural poor in organising themselves into co-ops and successful interventions by Co-operatives and Rural Development Institutions in the poverty reduction, to impart training in the area of co-operatives and rural development to officers of the IAS and other Class-I Services, organising Training Programs on Self Help Groups for IAS officers, and providing support to the National Institute of Administrative Research (NIAR) and other research units of the Academy.

Three days "Exposure Programme on Micro-Finance and Self-Help Group for IAS Officers" [April 10 – 12, 2003] was conducted at Hotel Pinewood, Shillong. This programme was mainly designed for the IAS officers of North-Eastern states. 26 participants of junior / middle level seniority from all N-E states attended the programme. Field visit to nearby areas and interaction with successful SHGs was also scheduled in the programme. Smt. Usha Sharma, IAS, Registrar Cooperative Societies Rajasthan; Dr. Ariz Ahammed, Deputy Commissioner, Tejpur; Ms. Silla Konghay, President Tangkhul Shenao Long, Ukhrul, Manipur and Shri H.R. Dave from NABARD also took part as resource persons and deliberated on important issues.

In July 28 - 30, 2003 a 3-days "Exposure Programme on Micro-Finance and Self-Help Groups for IAS Officers" was organized at the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration (LBSNAA), Mussoorie. The participants of this programme were IAS officers of middle / senior level (4 to 12 years of seniority) from New Delhi, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Chattisgarh and Uttaranchal. The resource persons of the course were Shri B.S. Suran, mCID, NABARD; Shri Neeraj Sharma, Deputy Director, Chinmaya Tapovan Trust, Sidhabari, Kangra (H.P.); Shri R.C. Pillai, Chairman, Prathama Bank, Moradabad (U.P.); Shri Rais Ahmad, Faculty Member, Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh (U.P.) and Shri Rajeev Seth, Manager, Planning and Development "MCIC", Prathama Bank, Moradabad (U.P.). They have taken important inputs on various issues related to Micro-Credit and Self Help Group. One day field visit to interact with the self help groups and

bankers was also organized. The valedictory address was given by Shri S. Akbar, GM, Regional Office, NABARD, Dehradun (Uttaranchal).

Similar programme is scheduled for the IAS officers of North-Eastern states during December, 2003 at Shillong. In addition, a programme for "SHGs in Uttaranchal" is also scheduled to be conducted at Dehradun in December, 2003. Further the proceedings of the exposure programmes conducted at Shillong and at Mussoorie were also edited and printed.

Chapter -7

Centre for Development of Software for Training of Administrators and Journals (SOFTRAIN)

The SOFTRAIN & Journal Section has been renamed as <u>Publication Cell</u> from May, 2003. The main functions of the Publication Cell are creation, collection and dissemination of appropriate training software and to publish a biannual Journal "The Administrator". It also develops background teaching materials in various areas of public management, economics, law, management, computers etc. There is an Editorial Board and a Core Group exists to monitor its activities, which are headed by the Director of the Academy. Shri T.K. Manoj Kumar, Deputy Director (Sr.) is the Incharge of the Cell and Editor of "The Administrator".

Functions

The work relating to development of training software and to publish "The Administrator" are the core functions of the Cell. The other functions are to :-

- (i) Identify the areas in which study is to be undertaken to prepare the Software;
- (ii) Identify Resource Persons to undertake the development of the Software;
- (iii) Establish linkages with national and international institutions having specialisation in particular areas, for exchange of information;
- (iv) Commission studies for providing an analytical framework on the basis of the information and data collected;
- (v) Suggest measures, strategy and methodology for tackling the problems identified;
- (vi) Identification and purchase of suitable training films;
- (vii) Publish the Source Books/Case Studies and other Books relating to training;
- (viii) Market the Software produced;

- (ix) Develop modules for Training of Trainers in Public Management;
- (x) Commission studies to assess the impact of training; and
- (xi) Experiment with alternate training methodology, including micro-community interventions.

Types of Training Software

The types of training software, the Cell has developed are the following:-

- (i) Source Books;
- (ii) Training Manuals;
- (iii) Case Studies; and
- (iv) Training Films.

Source Books and Training Manuals

The Cell has undertaken a major project to prepare a series of source books and training manuals for officers in the field on different aspects of administration. It is our aim that these should be practical and action oriented in character and they should serve as invaluable reference books for effective interventions by administrators working in the field; the intention is to produce books that serve as corpus of accumulated knowledge to be drawn up on by administrators in different stages of their career.

During the year the following books are under process or printed:-

- 1. Executive Magistrate Vol. I & II reprinted.
- 2. Revised Edition of District Disaster Management by Sh. P. Michael Vetha Siromony (under process).
- 3. Values and Ethics by Ms. Shashi Misra (under process).
- 4. Good Governance in 21st Century by Dr. V.K. Agnihotri (under process).
- 5. Training Manual on CCS Conduct Rules by Sh. B.V.R. Subrahmanyam (under process).

Case Studies

Among the training methodologies currently in use, perhaps the most effective for mid-career professionals is the methodology of case studies. Further, the feedback received from participants and programme coordinators of in-service courses suggests that this is the most preferred training and learning methodology. 21 case studies have been published so far.

This years position is as under:-

- 1. Case Study on Private Investment in sold waste management by Prof. Biju Varkkey (under process).
- 2. Out of 41, most of the case studies have been edited and some are being edited, for publication.

Training Material

The Publication Cell has helped in developing The Hand Book on "Yoga" by Prof. G. Radhakrishnan.

Academy Journal "The Administrator"

The Administrator is to serve as a platform for research and documentation in the areas of public administration, public management and public policy for practitioners and students of these fields. This year we have printed "The Administrator" Vol. 45 Issue Nos. 1 and 2. Vol. 46 issue No. 1 is under process.

National Centre for Gender Training, Planning and Research (NCGTPR)

Keeping in mind the customized courses and the importance of training to be relevant, the LBSNAA is backed up by research centers in various fields. The National Centre for Gender Training, Planning and Research was established in 1998, which aims to mainstream gender in policy, programme formulation and implementation in Government so as to establish gender as a priority concern in government and to ensure the equitable development of men and women. NGC's approach to gender equality has been to ensure that all aspects of its training programme mainstream gender equality issues in design and implementation and monitoring. The Centre delivers gender training through courses and sensitization inputs to understand the conceptual and analytical gender relations framework to the regular courses run by the Academy,

COURSE FOR NATIONAL ACADEMY OF CUSTOMS EXCISE & NARCOTICS, FARIDABAD: The National Gender Center conducted the training modules on Gender Issues in Feburary for the officers of Central and State Government:. The centre has organized workshops for NACEN, Faridabad for Group "A" Probationers, Senior Level Officers from the Indian Customs, Excise and Narcotics services. The main focus of the workshop was on law on Sexual Harassment, Gender Sensitization, issues related to working women at home and at workplace. The Centre was involved with NACEN in advising, developing gender-training modules, preparing reading material and organizing on gender issues from time to time.

Workshop on "Integration of Gender Issues into the Existing Syllabi of LBSNAA":- The Centre has been delivering gender training through courses and sensitization inputs to understand the conceptual and analytical gender relations framework to the regular courses run by the Academy, in the form of "stand-alone modules." In order to give gender issues the necessary attention there is a felt need to shift the focus from running "stand alone modules " on gender specific topics, to integration of gender issues into the existing syllabi and curriculum

of the Academy, which is developed for the Officer Trainees. The workshop was organised on "Integration of Gender Issues into the Existing syllabi of LBSNAA" on 14-16 June, 2003, at LBSNAA Mussoorie, with the aim of developing and designing a GENDER SENSITIVE training format, by integrating Gender Issues into the existing syllabi of compulsory programmes being run by the Academy for civil servants. The aim of the workshop was to MAINSTREAM GENDER into the existing syllabi of training programmes, run by the Academy (-rather than conduct stand alone modules/training sessions-), with a view to SENSITISE Civil Servants and Officer Trainees towards gender issues and to make them GENDER AWARE.

COURSES FOR THE LBSNAA:- The Centre delivers gender training through courses and sensitization inputs to understand the conceptual and analytical gender relations framework to the regular courses run by the Academy, for the Officer Trainee's of All India Service, and Central Services in the Foundation Course, Phase–I, Phase-II.

- 1. Sensitization Module Towards A Sensitive Work Culture:-A CORE MODULE was designed for the Foundation Course: with a FOCUS on" GENDER" rather than" WOMEN" is an integral part of the redesigned training module. The module, while explaining the CONCEPT of gender implies not looking at "women" and "women's issues" in isolation. Rather it emphasises the need to recognize the different needs of women and men.
- 2. The Professional courses for the IAS is in two phases, interspersed with District training, in order to achieve the objective, it was examined that as Village Visit works as an excellent sensitization mechanism, there is a need to design a questionnaire for the District training, in order to enable the probationers, to effectively collect the correct data on gender, understand the problems of rural women which will help them to examine the gender differentials in terms of access to health, on education etc. "The Report Status of **Empowerment"** was designed as part of the village visit report.
- 3. Apart from this the training is imparted to the officers of middle to senior level members of the IAS and officers promoted to the IAS from the state civil services attending in-service programmes.

Interaction With The Heads of Administrative Training Institutes: - Keeping in mind that networking is a fundamental tool for effective gender mainstreaming. NGC is working in a team - based partnership approach with the State training institutes to undertake the training programmes or projects. Gender training is a strategy to infuse and institutionalize gender concerns within organizations or, to put policy mandates into practice But significantly gender training not only pulls into focus gender issues it also improves the general way in, which an organization operates. In this role, the centre promotes gender issues through central and regional workshops to share the project experience with the ATI's to ensure quality inputs and promote networking. We tried to update about the work done by our institute regularly so that we can share the experiences of our institute with other ATI's.

While it is also doing research, advising, conducting training programmes and workshops on various issues, and is developing gender training modules and running courses for other institutions and clients like DOWCD, NCEAN, IGNFPA, UNFPA, NCW etc. covering various gender issues. Apart from this the centre plays a role by periodically conducting conscious advocacy Discussions, Essay Competitions for the Officer Trainees and introduces the prizes covering the sensitive issues like violence against women, women's health, sexual harassment at workplace, economic development activities and participation in the political arena etc.. This has been accomplished with a high degree of success within the existing and planned projects.

Chapter - 9

Centre for Disaster Management

In continuation with the decision of the MHA, Govt. of India for designating LBSNAA as nodal training institution for training in Incident Command System (ICS) and subsequently setting up a Centre for Disaster Management in the Academy, following activities have been in progress.

- As per decision taken during the debriefing meeting after the study tour to USA on Incident Command System, convened by Joint Secretary, MHA at LBSNAA, a detailed draft proposal for integration of ICS into Indian system of Disaster Management was sent to JS, MHA, vide D.O. letter No. ICS/DDS(RRM)/2003 dated 25.9.2003.
- 2. A workshop on ICS was conducted at the Academy (13-17 October, 2003) with three US experts and a group of officers from the Academy. The brainstorming sessions and experience sharing and mutual exchange about respective systems of disaster management in USA and India resulted in formulation of future training plan, scenario building exercises, further clarifications on integration of ICS etc.
- 3. In the meantime a letter (vide D.O. No. 1-8/2002-NDC(II) dated 15.10.2003) has been received from Mr. Pratyush Sinha, Secretary, Border Management, Ministry of Home Affairs, directly and also through JS (Trg.), DoPT on incorporation of capsule course on Disaster Management into training curricula of IAS officers into Foundation, Professional (Phase-I & Phase-II) and Induction Courses. This was discussed and a reply has been sent by the Director, LBSNAA to the Secretary, Border Management Vide D.O.No. ICS/RRM/2003 dated 31.10.2003. A copy was also marked to JS (Trg.), DoPT. The new module shall be introduced from current IAS Professional (Phase-I) Course.
- 4. The Disaster Management Support Project was formally launched by the Union Home Secretary on 19th January,

2004 in presence of officials of USAID and UNDP in which ICS training material was handed over formally by Ms. Deanne Shulman, USFS and Project Manager to Mr. Rajiv R. Mishra representing LBSNAA, Mussoorie.

- 5. The first training programme on Basic/Intermediate ICS was conducted at LBSNA, Mussoorie from 21.1.2004 to 30.1.2004. Profile of participants comprised of seven US Trainers/Resource Persons, seven faculty members ((Deputy Directors) from the LBSNAA and 16 persons from different states. During this period, a conference was also conducted with representative of USAID, USFS and LBSNAA to finalize ICS programme implementation activities.
- 6. The Conference of States Relief Commissioners/Secretaries is planned in last week of Magrch 2004.
- 7. A course on "Basic/Intermediate" is scheduled from March 16-20, 2004.

The first training programme on ICS Planning Section Course is scheduled to start from March 22, 2004.

Facilities at the LBSNAA

Gandhi Smriti Library

The Academy has one of the most prestigious and well-stacked Computerised Libraries in the country. It is located among scenic surroundings in the new building "Karmashila". The north-eastern wing of the building gives a panoramic view of the majestic Himalayas, an eternal sense of togetherness with the nature. The Library is aptly named after Mahatma Gandhi as "Gandhi Smriti Library".

Library Resources: The library is a treasure chest of resources containing.

- Books & Reports
- Journals/Newsletters
- National Newspapers
- Regional Newspapers
- Regional magazines
- Audio Cassettes
- Video Cassettes
- CD-ROMs
- Maps
- Floppy disks

It has more than 1.5. Lakh documents, including bound volumes of Journals, 1858 Audio Cassettes, 1465 Video Cassettes and 447 Compact Disk. The Library has added 2728 documents, 1543 Audio Cassettes and 420 Video Cassettes during the period under report.

The details of the newspaper, periodicals received in the Library are asunder: Journals subscribed - 143, Journals received on Exchange basis - 60, Journals received on complimentary basis - 30, National daily Newspapers - 17, Regional daily Newspapers - 22, Popular Magazines - 30, Regional Magazines - 12, Children Magazines - 11, Children Newspaper -01.

In addition, the Library receives 24 News letters published by various National and International Organisations/ Institutions on complimentary basis.

Literature search services

Computerisation:

Library is fully automated. This year Library switched over to a new Library software i.e. LIBSYS with the help of this software the Library is maintaining different databases for books, reports, audio cassettes, video cassettes, CDs and journal articles. The library database is now available on Academy website, *civilservices.gov.in*

Professional Development:

To keep the library staff abreast with the latest development in field, staff members were deputed for attending the ILA and ISLIC conference as well as training programmes at Ahmedabad and Delhi (LIBSYS).

Computer Centre

- 1. All the sections of LBSNAA where work load is high, high speed network printers have been provided.
- 2. Previously, the internet connectivity for LBSNAA was from VSNL through a 512 Kbps RF link. During the current year the internet connectivity has been shifted to a more reliable link through optic fiber.
- 3. Academy is also planning to put up a full network security system with firewall that will include facilities like Internet Management, Bandwidth Management, Network Security, etc.
- 4. After the passage of the IT bill in the country, LBSNAA has taken steps and started a Project for Automation of Work Flow for electronic processing of documents and minimal use of paper in the Academy.

Official Language Wing राजभाषा अनुभाग

With a view to ensure progressive use of Hindi and also to comply with the Official Language policy of the Union, an independent section known as the 'Official Language Section' came into existence in the Academy in the year 1986. This section functions under the overall guidance and supervision of the Administrative Head, who was assisted by Dr. Prem Shanker, Professor & Coordinator, Faculty of Hindi and Regional Languages as Officer-In-

charge till October, 2003 and thereafter, Shri Mukesh Puri, Deputy Director (Senior) took charge as Officer-in-charge of the Official Language Section. Also, two Junior Translators from the Central Secretariat Official Language Service, Department of Official Language, New Delhi are looking after the day to day work of the Section. During the year, the Official Language Section, with an all-out effort, performed the various jobs under two major heads as follows-

Implementation

- 1. Efforts were made to achieve the targets set in the Annual Programme prepared and circulated by the Department of Official Language, Govt. of India for the year 2003-2004. In this direction, target-wise correspondence in Hindi from the Academy with all the three regions was ensured and accordingly 100% correspondence with the regions A & B, and around 65% with the region C was ensured in Hindi. Further, bilingual preparation, publication and circulation of all the items required to be bilingual under Section 3(3) of the Official Languages Act was ensured in toto.
- 2. Work done in Hindi under the Annual Hindi Noting & Drafting Incentive Scheme by the officials was evaluated by a committee constituted for the purpose and accordingly, the prize winners were awarded with the cash and the citation on the occasion of the Hindi Day celebration.
- 3. A number of competitions in Hindi were organised on the occasion of Hindi Day celebration wherein citation and cash awards were given away by the Director to the prize winners.

Translation

Besides, routine translation of letters, orders, circulars, notices, tender notices, annual report, question papers, disciplinary proceedings, etc. the Official Language Section endeavored to make available the Hindi translation of course manual of the 73rd & 74th Foundation Courses, in addition to the academic inputs in the form of hand outs and lecture notes relating to Public Administration, Law, Indian History & Culture, Management, Ethics, Village Visit, Economics etc.

Medical Facilities

The Dispensary provides out patient care to all the officer-trainees, members of faculty, staff and their families. Emergency care is

provided round the clock. Referral facilities are made available at St. Mary Hospital, Landour Community Hospital, Doon Hospital and Military Hospital, Dehradun. Some of the activities taken up by the Dispensary, in the year, were:-

- 1. Blood donation camp was organised with the help of Doon Hospital during summer foundation course on 22/6/2003. Thirty-six donors donated blood.
- 2. Blood donation camp was organised during the 74th FC with the help of Doon Hospital on 21/11/2003. Eighty donors donated blood on that day.
- 3. A camp was organised under the National Polio Eradication Programme on 9/11/2003 in the Academy for children below 5 years of the faculty and staff.
- 4. By regular, routine check-up some tuberculosis patients, epileptic patients were diagnosed and are undergoing treatment.
- 5. Visiting doctors specialising in different fields, e.g Medicine. Orthopedics, Opthalmology, Dental medicine, Gynaecology, Pediatrics are rendering their services to all OTs, faculty, guests, staff and their families etc. Besides this, regular check-ups of In-Service participants, Induction Course and Foundation Course were done from time to time.
- The dispensary rendered service by active participation in trekking, cross-country, athletic meet, fete etc. Classes on First Aid were taken during summer Foundation Course for officer-trainees.
- 7. Regular health check-up of Balwadi School students was done. The Dispensary doctors attend the Coolie Camps regularly once a week for treatment of coolie patients which is being organised by the Society for Social Service.

Others

Since July 1989, a Kendriya Bhandar is functioning in the Academy premises just outside the main gate under the auspices of Central Government Employees' Consumer Co-operative Society Limited, New Delhi. This provides essential commodities of daily need, quality foodstuffs, and other consumer items at competitive rates.

It caters to the needs of the office too. These services are open to members of the public too. The Academy has a post office, which fulfills the needs of the Academy and the adjoining areas. The State Bank of India has a branch at the Academy. In addition, two barbershops, a tailor-shop and a bakery-shop meet the daily needs of the trainees and visitors to the Academy.

Chapter -11

Total Quality Management In Training Institutions

The Academy has been recognized as the lead institute for Total Quality Management in Training Institutions. As part of the TQM initiative, the Academy undertakes a number of activities. These include TQM initiatives within the Academy, which involve a number of staff oriented activities and upgrading facilities and utilities within the Academy. In addition, the Academy has brought in TQM concepts as essential inputs in almost all courses conducted in the Academy. TQM have in fact become an integral part of the courses run in the Academy. Some of the significant TQM topics are:

- 1. Relevance of the Concept of Quality in Government
- 2. PDCA
- 3. 5 'S'
- 4. Process Management
- 5. Bench Marking
- 6. Problem solving techniques
- 7. Excellence Model.

These inputs have been extremely useful and of practical value by the participants and are being used to make changes in the functioning of some offices leading to better service and better quality. Some such applications have also been documented in the half-yearly newsletter, "Quality Government" brought out by the TQM Cell and circulated to all Government of India departments, State Governments and Training Institutions.

To take the message of TQM to a wider audience, the Academy also sponsors a one-day special plenary session on Quality in Government as part of the annual Quality Summit of the Confederation of Indian Industry, New Delhi. This year the summit was held at Bangalore on 6th November 2003. This session

was attended by more than 100 senior/middle level civil servants of different State Government, Government of India and PSUs and was found to be very useful. The Government of Karnataka was co-sponsor of the seminar.

A one week Workshop on Citizen's Charter for Developing Trainers was conducted from 22 to 26 September, 2003. The workshop was conducted on behalf of Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances (Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions), Government of India. 15 participants from the Central Training Institutions attended the programme.

Activities of Clubs and Societies

Trainees are encouraged to lead a rich and varied campus life to give expression to their creative potential. To achieve this, they organise themselves into various clubs and societies. The activities of these clubs & societies during the year were as follows:-

The Adventure Sports Club

During 2003 the Adventure Sports Club organised the following activities.

- 1. A short Trek for the OTs of the 73rd F.C. to Sir George Everest Bunglaw was organised on 5th April, 2003.
- 2. A short treck Trek to LAL Tibba was organised on 14th April, 2003 for the OTs of the IAS Phase-1 (2002-2004 batch)
- 3. During 73rd FC & IAS Phase-I Para Sailing was organised on 10.5..2003 in which 21 OTs & one Faculty Member participated.
- 4. Para Sailing was also organised on 14.6.03 for the OTs of the 73rd F.C. in which 18 OTs Participated.
- 5. River Rafting was organised on 8.4.03 in which total 42 OTs of the 73rd F.C. & IAS Phase-1 & one member of the Faculty participated.
- 6. A Short Course on Rock-Climbing were also organised on 11th,12th & 13th April, 2003 for the OTs 73rd F.C. with the help of the ITBP.
- 7. A Short Course on Rock-Climbing were also organised on 22nd & 23rd Nov. 2003 for the OTs 74th F.C. with the help of the ITBP.
- 8. During the 74th F.C. River Rafting were organised on 11th & 12th Oct 2003 in which 135 OTs & three members of the Faculty were Participated.
- 9. Para Sailing was organised on 11th & 12th Oct 2003 in which 46 OTs Participated.

The Alumni Association

The Academy has taken up the task of becoming a forum for discussion and exchange of views by the alumni of the Academy. A corner for the alumni the Academy website has been introduced. The alumni corner of the website will enable the users having access to host messages, chat on various issues and exchange information, etc. The Association is in the process of sending individual ID and Password for each of the IAS Officers of the States.

On 21st October 2003, the "Commemoration Day for the Martyrs" was celebrated which was organised by the Alumni Association and honoured those officers who sacrificed their lives in the service for the nation. On this day, the Director also inaugurated a Photo Gallery of the martyrs.

The Alumni Association had also been bestowed with an Endowment by the directly recruited members of the 1948 batch of the IAS, and an Essay Competition on the subject selected by a Committee of officers is organized every year for IAS Officers on All India basis. With the consent of the members of 1948 Batch, who have established the Endowment Fund, the Essay Competition had also been opened for all Services from the year 2002. The topic for the year 2001-02 & 2002-03 is " What Ails the I.A.S. and Remedies Therefor" and an award for the best essay is yet to be given. The Computer Society

During the year, the Computer Society has been holding various events like quizzes, lectures, classes and tutorials on computers. They have also taken steps to expose the Officer Trainees to new technologies and concepts in Information Technology and E-Governance. During the year 2003 the following programmes were organised by the Computer Society:

The Hobbies Club

The Hobbies Club undertook the following activities during the year, 2003.

- To develop aptitude of editing and other aspects of Journalism; and
- To develop latent artistic talents and cartooning skills.

Activities

During the 74th Foundation Course, the Society published two volumes of an in house magazine "Pratibimb" continuing articles and artwork by various probationers, and reflecting the life in the Academy. This was also supplemented by an informal wall journal "Wall u me" in which several OTs contributed pieces of topical interest. In order to preserve the memories of the batch, the society also brought a directory of probationers entitled "Remembrance".

The Management Circle

The Society for Contemporary Affairs

The Society is designed to provide a forum for discussion, debate and study of all matters of general interest, including current affairs, science and technology and subjects of topical interest. The field of operation assigned to this Society is quite large, because all activities of general nature, which are not specifically provided for under the constitutions of other Societies and Clubs, fall within its ambit. The Society for Social Services

The Society for Social services undertook the following activities during the year 2003.

Health Camp - This weekly Camp was conducted under the guidance of Dr. Sunil Senon. Some patients are undergoing treatment for Tuberculosis. A three year project for continuing the Health Camp was approved by the Prime Minister's Office under which assistance will be provided to the poor and needy patients for medicines, lab tests and other facilities.

The Academy Doctors, Academy Dispensary Unit and volunteers from the LBSNA staff and the trainees provided support. About 30 patients visit the camp every week. A Homeopathic Dispensary headed by Dr. Uniyal is also run by the Society. It is very popular and more than 20 patients visit it every day.

During the Foundation Course, officer trainees were actively involved in the programme of the Society. The Lalita Shastri Balwadi is run by the Society, mainly for the wards of the Academy staff. The Society has also provided toys, maps, and many articles, which are useful in making the students of L.S. Balwadi aware and giving them conducive environment to study. A mid day meal programme is included for the students of the Balwadi in which students are provided with fruits, dalia, savia etc. as their mid day meal.

A tailoring Center is run for the girls, to help them develop skills to make them independent. A new electronic machine [for designing, picko etc.] was provided to the Sewing Centre.

A Fete was conducted by the Society during the Foundation Course. It helped in promoting greater interaction between the Officer Trainees, and also gave them an experience of organizing events. This also generated funds for the Society.

Two Blood Donation Camps were organized by the Society. This has been a regular feature on the calendar of the Society for the last few years. The Director's Nominee was Shri Mukesh Puri. Shri M. R. Unithan, Shri A. M. Nandan and Shri A. Nallasamy were the Director's Associate Nominee on the Society for Social Service.
